

CITY OF SEATAC RECEIVES TRANSIT ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT GRANT

City of SeaTac, Wash. (December 19, 2014) - Smart Growth America—a national nonprofit that advocates for better cities, towns, and neighborhoods—announced that SeaTac is among 14 winning communities selected from over 120 applications that will receive a free technical assistance workshop in 2015. Through the program, the community will receive hands-on assistance from national experts on moving transit oriented development from concept to reality in a suburban setting.

SeaTac Mayor Mia Gregerson commented, "The technical assistance provided by Smart Growth America will further our goal of engaging the community to make our three station areas more accessible by foot and bicycle and creating activity nodes where we can focus transit oriented development.
