SeaTac also considers information contained in any environmental documents prepared by adjacent jurisdictions or other agencies that provide the City with documents for review and incorporates this information into its goals, policies, and regulations as appropriate.

BEST AVAILABLE SCIENCE

The City of SeaTac employed the best available science to update its Environment Element and review its Environmentally Sensitive Areas regulations in 2004. Wetland values and functions to be protected were derived from the City's Goals and Policies. Riparian habitat, being closely connected to the health of wetlands, was included in that assessment. The City closely considered the protection of threatened/endangered salmonid species and their habitat as well, based in large part on the following documents:
