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Resident Satisfaction Survey

The City of SeaTac recently conducted a resident satisfaction survey and received 299 completed surveys, through a combination of online and paper surveys, as well as in-person surveys conducted by community liaisons and the Library Advisory Committee. The survey was conducted to help inform and align the City's policy and budgeting decisions with community needs. This project was also an opportunity to pilot the innovative community liaisons model. Community liaisons are SeaTac residents who make it easy for other residents to participate in the survey by going where residents gather: the Senior Center, Bow Lake Mobile Home Park, Valley View Library and in the neighborhoods. Community liaisons have connections in many different communities so that we are able to survey a wide breadth of SeaTac residents.

On Thursday, May 21, the City held a community meeting to share the survey results www.ci.seatac.wa.us/residentsatisfactionsurvey. We had a great turnout! There were close to eighty attendees, including residents, councilmembers and city staff. Attendees were invited to participate in small group discussions on key issues identified through the survey:

- What makes SeaTac a good place to live?
- Where do you feel unsafe and what feels unsafe about that location?
- What would improve the City's communication?
- What would make the City more "clean and well kept"?

CITY PLANTS TREES FOR ARBOR DAY

On Wednesday, April 22, the City celebrated Arbor Day by planting six Douglas Fir trees at Angle Lake Park. Volunteers from the Washington Conservation Core, Radisson Hotel and City staff dug in to plant the trees. Councilmember Pam Fernald read a proclamation and Washington Community Forestry representatives Terry Flatley and Joe Scorcio presented the City's sixth Tree City USA and fourth Tree City Growth Award.

Transforming the S. 154th Street Station Area

As the City prepares to spark the redevelopment of the S. 154th Street Station Area, a group of skilled and experienced professionals weighed in through an Urban Land Institute Technical Assistance Panel (TAP). The TAP report was presented to the City Council and public at the April 14 meeting and can be accessed at www.ci.seatac.wa.us/154thStTAP.

The S. 154th Street TAP is the second such effort conducted in partnership with the Urban Land Institute. The first — done in 2013 — focused on the S. 200th Street area, in anticipation of the Angle Lake light rail station. That report helped to shape both Sound Transit's station area design and the City's Angle Lake District Plan.

The City's S. 154th Street Station Area Plan envisions a neighborhood with a mix of housing, commercial and open space that creates a more pedestrian friendly environment that takes advantage of the proximity to the light rail and other transportation options. The objective of the TAP was to gain insight into what form transit oriented development can take; how to support the desired future community and economic development goals of the current SeaTac community; and how the City's land assemblage should be positioned to provide the catalyst for the redevelopment of the station area.

The TAP report represents the thinking of a diverse group of experts. It is one perspective of many that will help shape how the City moves forward with steps to implement the community's vision for the neighborhood. Most importantly, the report will guide important policy decisions about how to move forward. Among those are:

- How should the City's return on investment be measured?
- What importance will be placed on non-financial community and social benefits?
- What level and types of additional investments should the City consider to incentivize redevelopment?

These and many other important considerations will inform the next steps of this transformational project over the next few years.

City of SeaTac honored as a WellCity

The City of SeaTac was recently honored with the WellCity Award by the Association of Washington Cities (AWC). This is the City's eleventh consecutive WellCity Award.

The AWC Employee Benefit Trust's annual WellCity Awards recognize members that meet nine best practice standards for employee health promotion. Members of the AWC Employee Benefit Trust are eligible to apply for the award. This includes cities, towns, and non-city entities. SeaTac was one of 111 Trust-insured cities to

earn the 2015 WellCity Award. WellCity has three levels of recognition to encourage program growth and longevity. SeaTac has earned the WellCity Award of Excellence.

This is the highest level of recognition.



AWC Trust members that earn the 2015 WellCity Award receive a 2% premium discount on Regence and Group Health medical premiums. The discount to 2015 premiums by receiving this award is estimated to save the City \$31,844.40 on medical premiums.

Construction Update

Connecting 28th/24th Avenue S.

The Connecting 28th/24th Avenue S. project is progressing toward completing design and advertising for construction bids later this year. The project will construct a new principal arterial road between S. 200th and S. 208th Streets and connect 26th Avenue S. to 24th Avenue S. The new road will include four general purpose lanes, turn pockets, and a shared use path along both sides. This project completes the north-south corridor from S. 188th Street to S. 216th Street.

The completed corridor will improve access and circulation for the new Angle Lake light rail station at S. 200th Street and 28th Avenue S. and help ease congestion along International Boulevard. Also, the new road will provide access to approximately 200 acres for redevelopment and potential new jobs to the area. The road is anticipated to be open in spring 2017. 37th/40th Avenue S. Sidewalk Project

Community Volunteers 'Step Up for SeaTac' at Annual Community Litter Cleanup Event

Affordable Curbside Collection with Recology CleanScapes

Recology CleanScapes, the City of SeaTac's solid waste service provider, offers affordable garbage, recycling and food & yard waste collection service to residents and businesses. While curbside collection is not mandatory in the City of SeaTac, residents who self haul their waste to the transfer station may be able to save time and money by subscribing to service with Recology CleanScapes.

With Recology CleanScapes curbside service you get:

- Free curbside recycling and food & yard waste service.
- Free carts.
- Free recycling for difficult items: fluorescent tubes, batteries, motor oil, small appliances and more.
- Once each calendar year, SeaTac residential customers may request a free "Curbside Clean-up" of up to one cubic yard extra garbage. The extra item may not be larger than 3ft x 3ft x 3ft or weigh more than 65 lbs. For residential curbside customers, additional bulky waste items (appliances, sofas, chairs, mattresses) are charged a pickup fee of \$20.
- A customer service staff that is available seven days a week to answer questions and assist with services.

Compare Costs:

Self-haul: Minimum \$22.00 per entry (includes basic fee, surcharge and tax). Four weeks = \$88.00.

Know Your Neighbor

Do you know your neighbor? For many residents the answer is "no". The reality is that in the past 20 years society has become a place where we have less connection to those who live around us. "Why should I care?" you may ask. You probably feel reassured knowing that you have family or close friends in the region that you can count on in an emergency. But what would happen if you were unable to reach out to them?

Recently we've witnessed several large-scale disasters that have hinted at what might occur. Hurricanes Sandy and Katrina brought some of the most developed and populous areas of our nation to a standstill for weeks before any sense of normalcy was restored. The 2011 tsunami in Japan so isolated an entire region of that nation that many of its residents were not heard from for months.

In an effort to better prepare our own community, the SeaTac Office of Emergency Management (OEM) is embarking on two new initiatives to strengthen the resiliency of our neighborhoods. The first program assists local residents with developing their own neighborhood-based communications hubs. Each hub will be staffed by resident-volunteers,

supported by the City's OEM and will serve as a local information and resource center. Local hubs will have the most current information about an emergency and can also use their local hub to report damage or injury or request aid. Hubs will have direct communications with the City's Emergency Coordination Center so urgent requests and updates can be relayed without delay.

Complementing our community hubs will be the introduction of the Map Your Neighborhood program. This program allows neighbors to identify unique local situations and needs that might arise during an emergency. Residents then develop a plan to address those issues and support community members. SeaTac OEM will provide the necessary training and only receive that information important to community recovery. This is a neighbor-helping-neighbor program designed to establish a first level of response and assistance within the community. Good Neighbor Recognition

The City of SeaTac's Good Neighbor Award gives you the opportunity to recognize individuals for their acts of goodness and call attention in a positive way to the benefits of being a good neighbor. Community members are nominated by their peers and the award recipients will be chosen from those submissions.

The 2015 Good Neighbor Award is restricted to actions for January 2014 through July 2015. The recognition program will have one Good Neighbor Award and three honorable mentions; all nominees will be recognized. Nominations will be accepted through July, with the award winners being announced at the 2015 SeaTac International Festival held at Angle Lake Park this year on September 12 – 13.

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Neighborhood Grant Program – Still Time to Apply

The City of SeaTac's 2015 Neighborhood Grant Program will continue to accept applications through July 15, 2015.

SeaTac is committed to promoting and sustaining an environment that is responsive to resident involvement. The purpose of the program is to encourage the formation of neighborhoods that work together for neighborhood identity through collaborative projects. It is the goal of the Neighborhood Grant Program to build viable partnerships between the City and its residents.

Total grant funds available for the overall 2015 Neighborhood Grant Program equal \$5,000. Only qualified applications will be considered. Awarded projects will be determined by the amount of qualified applications the City receives and is limited to how many projects can be accommodated within the \$5,000 program budget.

The 2015 Neighborhood Grant Program projects require a two (neighborhood) to one (City) match for City funds awarded (2:1 match). For every dollar requested through the grant fund, two dollars of match must be provided by the applicant group. The applicant match is typically volunteer labor, donated materials, supplies and/or professional services.

Examples of projects include: neighborhood identity (signage, kiosks), community gardens, play areas, neighborhood events (Block Watch, Map Your Neighborhood), public amenity (benches, sculpture), neighborhood clean-up, youth projects, secure mailboxes, artwork/neighborhood beautification, or other similar improvements.

- Projects must meet the program requirements.
- 2015 pilot program is limited to \$5,000.
