At their January 5, 2016 Special Council Meeting, the City Council elected Rick Forschler as Mayor and Michael J. Siefkes as Deputy Mayor through 2017.

Councilmembers Kathryn Campbell (position 2), Tony Anderson (position 4), and Pam Fernald (position 6) were not up for re-election. Their terms run through December 31, 2017.

Position 1 – Rick Forschler

I've lived in the SeaTac area since 1974. I retired from Boeing after 30 years as a Manufacturing Engineer and IT Professional. This is my second election to the City Council; my first term was 2009 to 2013. UTILITY TAX REPEALED

On December 8, the City Council repealed the utility tax effective March 1, 2016. The six percent (6%) tax originally adopted in October 2014 applied to electric energy, natural or manufactured gas, solid waste (5%), surface water management, telephone, and cable television businesses within the city. The repeal does not change the ability of low-income senior citizens to apply for relief during the time period the tax was in effect. Community Leadership Academy

The City will host its first Community Leadership Academy this spring to enhance community involvement while sharing information about how city government operates. The academy will include presentations by City officials responsible for services ranging from public safety and street maintenance to the local court system, policy making and budgeting. Some presentations may include tours of facilities, such as a fire station, or "field trips" to other City locations such as the community center.

Participation is open to SeaTac residents, business owners, service providers and students 18 years or older who live, work or attend school in SeaTac. Construction Update



Connecting 28th/24th Avenue S.

The Connecting 28th/24th Avenue S. project is progressing toward award of the construction contract. The schedule was adjusted to include a new bridge and culvert structure added to the project. These structures allow the future State Route 509 extension to be constructed with minimal impacts to traffic on 28th/24th Avenue S. The project will construct a new principal arterial road between S. 200th and S. 208th Streets and connect 26th Avenue S. to 24th Avenue S. in Des Moines. The new road will include four general purpose lanes, turn pockets, and a shared use path along both sides. This project completes the north-south corridor from S. 188th Street to S. 216th Street.

The completed corridor will improve access and circulation for the new Angle Lake Light Rail Station at S. 200th Street and 28th Avenue S. and help ease congestion along International Boulevard. The new road will also provide access to approximately 200 acres for redevelopment, potentially adding new jobs to the area. The road is anticipated to be open in late 2017. 37th/40th Avenue S. Sidewalk Project

Construction is underway on the 37th/40th Avenue S. Sidewalk project. This project will construct sidewalks on both sides of 37th Avenue S. from S. 166th Street to S. 172nd Street, and on 40th Avenue S. from S. 166th Street to S. 170th Street. 32nd Avenue S. Sidewalk Project

The City's seventh Neighborhood Sidewalk Project is under design with construction scheduled for summer 2016. This project will add sidewalks on both sides of 32nd Avenue S. from S. 188th Street to S. 192nd Street. South 200th Street Light Rail Update

Construction continues to proceed on schedule for the new Sound Transit Angle Lake Light Rail Station at S. 200th Street. The guideway, track work, and station elevators and escalators have been completed. Station and guideway electrical systems are slated to be completed by February 2016.

The elevators in the parking garage are being installed and are expected to be finished in March 2016.

The roadway improvement portion of the project continues with construction from S. 200th Street from International Boulevard to the vicinity of Des Moines Creek, and 28th Avenue S. from S. 204th Street to S. 200th Street. This work is expected to be finished by April 2016, and service is expected to be ready the following month.

National Experts Assist SeaTac to Encourage Transit Oriented Development

On October 6 and 7, the City's Community and Economic Development staff hosted Ms. Dena Belzer from Strategic Economics (Berkeley, CA) and John Robert Smith from Smart Growth America (Washington D.C.) as part of a free technical assistance program. The City was one of

14 communities nationwide out of approximately 120 applicants that was successful in being awarded these services from Smart Growth

America (SGA). The



members and City staff.
The presentation relayed how the public investment in transit stations can positively influence how a community grows.

program is made possible through a five-year "Building Blocks for Sustainable Communities" grant to SGA from the US Environmental Protection Agency's Office of Sustainable Communities.

As a national leader in the field, SGA has accumulated extensive experience working with communities to help them use land strategically, make the most of existing resources and invest strategically to catalyze private development. They are the only national organization dedicated to researching, advocating for and leading coalitions to bring smart growth practices to more communities nationwide.

The following day, an all-day workshop was held to provide staff from both local and regional agencies with tools and techniques to bring about the vision for the future found in the City's long-range plans. During this workshop, participants broke up into groups to discuss steps to improve each of the City's three light rail station areas.

Ms. Belzar and Mr. Smith are nationally-recognized experts

in the area of transit-oriented development (often referred to

as TOD). After touring the City and its three light rail station areas, an introductory presentation was made to a group of

residents, Planning Commission members, City Council

The two-day event provided a lot of good ideas for moving the adopted plans within these station areas forward. This information will help guide future decisions as the City seeks to create walkable, vibrant centers around the light rail stations.

SeaTac Zoning Code Gets New, Streamlined Format

The City is pleased to announce that staff has reformatted the Zoning Code (Title 15 of the SeaTac Municipal Code) to make it easier to use by residents,

builders, staff and, well, everyone! The Zoning
Code was initially adopted in the early 1990s, upon incorporation of the City.
It was based upon the
King County Code that existed at that time and has since been amended many, many times. These incremental amendments have resulted in a

code that has become increasingly difficult to use.

The reformatted Zoning Code provides

for better organization,
makes it easier to find
frequently-used
regulations (such
as for fences), and
eliminates redundancies. No substantial
changes were included
as part of this process.

Existing zones, permitted uses and development standards (building heights, setbacks, etc.) all remain the same.

The newly reformatted Zoning Code also provides an improved framework for on-going code improvements and future projects, such as specific regulations that will apply to the area around the new Angle Lake Light Rail Station. The City remains committed to continuing to look for ways to streamline the Zoning Code for both ease of use and to respond to changing community needs. Winter Safety Tips

Winters in Western Washington are unpredictable and can range from the very mild to days of severe snow, wind, and rain. Because winter's worst weather is often between January and March, here are some tips and information to help keep you and your family safe.

Use candles with care. Often used decoratively or during power outages, candles should not be used as a substitute for flashlights unless there are no alternatives. Follow these candle safety rules:

- Always use a sturdy base under your candles that will resist tipping.
- Keep candles away from flammable materials such as curtains or bedding.
- "When you go out blow it out".
 Never leave burning candles unattended.


Also, during power outages many families utilize gasoline powered generators until the household power comes back on. These generators can supply power to furnaces, lights, stove tops, and other appliances.

Generators can literally be life savers when used correctly. Unfortunately, every winter we read stories about people who were affected by carbon monoxide (CO) that was produced by a generator that was brought into or near a home and left running.

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, almost odorless, and tasteless gas which is present during any type of burning. When inhaled, it depletes the oxygen supply in the blood stream. Symptoms of CO poisoning include lightheadedness, dizziness, headache, nausea, vomiting, seizures, decreased levels of consciousness, and in extreme cases, death.

It is not just generators that pose a hazard; barbecues – especially the charcoal type, vehicles left running in a garage, wood stoves, and certain non-electric space heaters also produce the potentially deadly gas.

You can reduce the chance of CO poisoning by following some basic rules:



- Purchase and install a carbon monoxide alarm in your home.
- If anyone in the home begins to complain of CO poisoning symptoms or the CO alarm activates, leave the residence and call 9-1-1.
- Have all CO producing appliances inspected and serviced according to the manufacturer's recommendation.

This winter take the time to make sure you use candles safely and that the danger of carbon monoxide is not present in your home.

SeaTac Updates Property Maintenance, Vehicle Storage Codes

The City Council has an adopted goal of increasing the effectiveness of code compliance efforts throughout all neighborhoods and areas of the city. As part of that on-going effort, in September 2015, the Council adopted a number of updates to the property maintenance standards found in Chapter 7.15 of the SeaTac Municipal Code (SMC). The amendments will provide the City's code compliance staff with more effective tools for addressing the variety of issues they typically investigate. Highlights include:

- Identification of items that can only be stored within an enclosed building (i.e., a garage or shed).
- Clarification of standards for maintaining vegetation and disposal of yard waste.



- Establishment of standards to provide proper clearance for any vegetation overhanging a sidewalk or street.
- Standards relating to the storage of motor vehicles on private property (found in SMC 7.25) were relaxed to ensure that a property owner may store an inoperable vehicle or RV in the rear yard of their lot, provided it is screened from view.

If possible, wait for first responders to arrive.

2016 Neighborhood Grant Program

The City of SeaTac is now accepting applications for the 2016 Neighborhood Grant Program. Applications will be accepted until May 15, unless an extension is announced. Decisions on grant awards are scheduled for June.

The City is not responsible for, nor will it pay for, any expenses or costs incurred by the applicant for the project prior to the City's project final approval.

SeaTac is committed to promoting and sustaining an environment that is responsive to resident involvement. The purpose of the program is to encourage the formation of neighborhoods that work together for neighborhood identity through collaborative projects. It is the goal of the Neighborhood Grant Program to build viable partnerships between the City and its residents.

Total grant funds available for the overall 2016 Neighborhood Grant Program equal \$5,000. Only qualified applications will be considered. Awarded projects will be determined by the amount of qualified applications the City receives and is limited to how many projects can be accommodated within the \$5,000 program budget.

The 2016 Neighborhood Grant Program projects require a 2 (neighborhood) to 1 (City) match for City funds awarded (2:1 match). For every dollar requested through the grant fund, two dollars of match must be provided by the applicant group. Applicant group matches are typically volunteer labor, donated materials, supplies and/or professional services.

Examples of projects include: neighborhood identity (signage, kiosks), play areas, neighborhood events (Block Watch, Map Your Neighborhood), public amenity (benches, sculpture), neighborhood clean-up, youth projects, secure mailboxes, artwork/neighborhood beautification, or other similar improvements.

Projects must meet the program requirements.

Domestic Violence During Football Season

Did you know that Super Bowl Sunday is the highest domestic violence day of the year? Researchers studying the 2012 football season found that 40% more women were battered on Super Bowl Sunday than on a normal Sunday.

The study showed that, while watching a typical football game, spectators are likely to consume more alcohol and become very aggressive. During Super Bowl week, there was a whopping 264% increase in units dispatched on domestic violence calls. This increase in the number of reports filed on game day has a serious impact on police departments. The emergency wards of area hospitals

report increases in admission of women in the categories of stabbings, gunshot wounds, assault and "accidental" falls.

The National Football League (NFL) is working to take a more proactive approach by making spectators aware of the problem of domestic violence. The NFL launched an experimental approach by airing a commercial on Super Bowl Sunday stating that this is the highest domestic violence day of the year and urging viewers to end the violence.

Good Neighbor

In 2015 the City launched the city-wide Good Neighbor Award recognition program, where SeaTac community members are encouraged to nominate individuals and/or groups for their acts of neighborly/community goodwill. Nominations allow community members to call attention in a positive way to the activities that the nominee has contributed to their neighbors and community by being an example of a "good neighbor". The 2015 program had one Good Neighbor Award winner and three Honorable Mentions. The 2015 recognition program was restricted to actions for January 2014 through July 2015. Future years will cover a one-year timeframe, so the 2016 Good Neighbor Award will be restricted to actions from August 2015 through July 2016.

Michael Doughty: for countless volunteer hours in coordinating, launching and maintaining the SeaTac United Windmill after-school program held in a safe

environment that includes STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) followed by SUMA (SeaTac United Math Academy) programs for SeaTac children in addition to his non-competitive soccer programs. Michael was recognized for how he works tirelessly to coordinate community donations and community volunteers (adults and high school students) to provide SeaTac kids with opportunities to which they would not normally have access. The majority of the children participating are low income and come from culturally diverse backgrounds. The Windmill program provides Chromebooks for the participants to use during their STEM/SUMA afterschool hour with small group and individual one-on-one peer mentoring, enabling kids to practice math and science skills in a fun, competitive way, and complementing the core curriculum in the SeaTac schools. Mr. Doughty was praised as a great role model, always taking time to visit with all parents and their children. The end of the programs have a party complete with awards, pizza or summer barbecue, and activities are designed to ensure all the children feel special. Mr. Doughty is continuing the Windmill program to eventually include activities at the

Matt Griffin YMCA. The programs are open to all SeaTac elementary children.

Paavo and Rauni Sillanpaa: for the couple's extra mile assistance to a neighbor whose disability has advanced and restricted her physical abilities. The Sillanpaas have taken upon themselves the neighbor's yard care to include not only regular maintenance, but also repairing many broken items, removing two trees that needed to be taken down, and repairing fallen gutters and an aging fence. The Sillanpaas are both over 70 years old and have assisted their neighbor in addition to

for their litter pickup during their regular daily walks and their consistent friendliness with everyone they meet during their walks. Doris and Floyd offer a quick wave and smile, each carrying a plastic bag and pick-up-stick to collect the litter and trash along their walks. Doris and Floyd were nominated by three different community members – all for the same "good neighbor" attitude.

Bruce and Pat Ernst: for their consistent involvement and volunteerism within the Bow Lake Senior Retirement Community. Bruce and Pat helped organize the Bow Lake National Night Out event and have been integral

in the starting of a Block Watch Program for the whole mobile home community for 2015.

Peter Kwon: for his involvement in the McMicken Nextdoor online community and providing an avenue for his community members to address mail theft by coordinating a group discount purchase of individual, secure locking mailboxes. Peter additionally volunteers his assistance to residents who need help replacing their mailboxes and has been active in the community in addressing abandoned property issues.

Chuck D'Arielli: for always being available to lend a hand when any neighbors need assistance, whether it be with their car, home maintenance, or yard work.

Melissa Wells: for her involvement as a founding member of the McMicken Nextdoor online community, for organizing the first Block Watch on her street and for regularly hosting events to inform, educate and empower her neighbors to help reduce crime.

DeDe McConnell: for her initiative in organizing yard work parties to help neighbors with property maintenance and as an advocate for cleaner

neighborhoods and streets, often working with code compliance and police to help reduce crime in her community.

Vicki Lockwood: for her volunteerism with many local community organizations. She sends out a monthly email newsletter to keep neighbors informed of local crime events, participates in local community building yard work parties, and other community events that benefit the neighborhood.

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New Tourism Group Off to Running Start

In October 2014, the SeaTac City Council chartered the Seattle Southside Regional Tourism Authority (RTA), a first-of-its-kind organization in the State of Washington. The RTA is managing the increased funding being generated by the local lodging industry's self-imposed Tourism Promotion Area (TPA) assessments.

The independent Board of Directors and staff are responsible for the management and delivery of tourism promotion activities for the cities of Des Moines, SeaTac and Tukwila. This innovative approach is the result of a coordinated effort led by the SeaTac staff and City Council. The RTA has also served as the legislative model for the new statewide tourism effort that is being supported by the Washington Tourism Alliance, Destination Marketing Organization and the Washington Lodging Association.

The RTA began receiving its operating revenue in July of 2015 and the total amount generated by the TPA during the first eight months was more

than \$2.2 million. The President and CEO was hired mid-September and will be hiring additional staff during the first quarter of 2016. The RTA will present its first Strategic Business Plan in early 2016.

The hospitality industry is estimated to have generated over \$659 million in tourism spending during 2014 and employed over 5,300 people in the Seattle Southside region. This past year, 2015, was a record year for the lodging industry in the area. Several new hotels are planned for construction here in SeaTac. Assisted by the great work being done by the RTA, the tourism industry in our city will continue to grow and to be a driving force for the economy.
