City Hall and City Facilities will be closed Monday, September 5 for Labor Day

S. 200th Street Reopens

Sound Transit is restoring area roads in preparation for the opening of the Angle Lake Station. Construction crews are finishing up work on a new culvert over Des Moines Creek along S. 200th Street. On Thursday, Sept. 1, Sound Transit's contractor reopened S. 200th Street between 26th Avenue S. and 18th Avenue S.

Work hours 7:00 AM - 5:00 PM:

In order to maintain a safe work zone, one lane of traffic will be open during daytime hours. Flaggers will be placed on both sides of the street to allow cars to pass through.

After work hours:

Both lanes on S. 200th Street will be opened for two way traffic

SeaTac Improves Insurance Rating

The City of SeaTac and the Kent Regional Fire Authority (RFA) are proud to announce that the Washington Surveying and Rating Bureau (WSRB) has improved the SeaTac's protection class from Class 4 to Class 3.

The WSRB was asked earlier this year to evaluate the Kent RFA response area. The City of SeaTac's last evaluation was in 2007. Evaluators looked at water supply, the Fire Department, emergency communications, new equipment such as the aerial ladder truck and fire safety controls to establish the new rating.

SeaTac Acting City Manager Joe Scorcio said: "This improved classification and rating is great news for the City of SeaTac's residents, businesses and property owners. And, although decisions on lower premiums are made on a case-by-case basis by the insurer, the new rating sets the stage for potential future savings." He added: "the rating upgrade was one of the goals of the City's contractual relationship with the Kent Regional Fire Authority."

The improved protection class rating goes into effect on January 1, 2017.



CONSTRUCTION ALERTS

Military Road S. & S. 200th Street

Traffic will be impacted at the intersection of Military Road S. and S. 200th Street for the next week or two as WSDOT makes improvements to the intersection.

Work begins on 24th Avenue S. - S. 142nd Street to S. 128th Street

Construction will begin on the 24th Avenue South Overlay - Phase 2 project on Tuesday September 6. Traffic will be impacted during working hours with flaggers managing one-lane closures through the work areas. Once preparation work for paving begins, the road will be very rough. No full road closures will take place, but alternate routes may be preferable.



This project will improve the existing storm drainage system, replace damaged sidewalk and curb and provide a new driving surface. Questions and concerns regarding this project can be directed to Assistant City Engineer Janet Mayer, 973.4742.



Tukwila Police and SeaTac Community Meeting – August 29

Approximately 60 community members from Tukwila and SeaTac attended this community meeting to discuss a recent spike in violent crime in Tukwila, along the shared border on the north end of our City. The meeting was requested by the Neighbors Without Borders Action Committee and organized by Tukwila Police Department. Residents learned that three of the events that affected the area are not related to each other and that they are still under investigation, therefore little more information could be released. SeaTac Police reported that there has not been a spike in violent crime on our side of the border and that the violence does not appear to be related to crime in our city. Chiefs Villa and Mulligan emphasized the importance of community engagement and partnerships between the police departments, especially during these kinds of spikes.

A small group of community members led Chief Mulligan and Community Service Officer Sana Wight on a "Walk Along" in the immediate area, following the meeting.

SeaTac Police Implements New Community Engagement Program – Walk Along

Many police departments offer a "Ride-Along Program" - opportunities for civilians to ride with a police officer for a shift, getting a cops-eye view of their city or neighborhood. This is a great educational tool which gives civilians opportunities to see how police deal with the realities of the local policing environment.

Over the last 3 months, the SeaTac Police Department has piloted a fun and effective variation of the Ride Along – "Walk Along". This program is intended to provide educational opportunities to the community members who participate; it creates opportunities for police officers to walk with residents in their normal walking areas, learning about those areas from the perspective of the resident walker. In addition to engaging with community members in a whole different way, our police officers are learning about crime and nuisance issues that plague neighborhoods and passing that information back to other officers to further increase our service value.

SeaTac Police have conducted four of these walks to test the value of the program. The first was in and around North SeaTac Park, with two residents; the second in a McMicken neighborhood with one resident, the third around an Angle Lake Neighborhood with nine residents and finally along Military Road S. & S. 138th Street, with eight residents.

Disturbance Leads to Shooting Motel 6

On August 31 at about 10:00 PM three adult males got into an argument with another male, in the parking lot of the Motel 6 at S. 189th Street & 47th Avenue S. The lone male pulled a gun and fired shots, hitting one of the three and killing him. A stray bullet entered one of the motel rooms and struck an innocent, unrelated man in the back. This injured man was transported to a local hospital and was in good condition Thursday night. The suspect left the scene in a dark colored older car. He was described as a black male in his 20's wearing a grey hooded sweatshirt and dark pants. As of Thursday, he remains at large. The crime is being investigated King County Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Detectives with support from SeaTac Police.
