Fall is in the Air

Cooler weather means turning on the heat

As the season turns from summer to fall, cooler weather means that many residential heating systems will be turned on to warm homes.

Before turning on the heat for the first time, there are some safety tips that will help reduce the chance of a fire in your home.

- Move all flammable materials away from electric baseboard heaters at least six (6) inches. This
 includes curtains, bedding, clothing, and furniture.
- Have chimneys cleaned and inspected by a professional and make sure the flue is open before
 using your fireplace or wood stove.
- Clean or replace the air filters in your furnace.
- Have your furnace inspected by a professional at regular intervals.
- If you have a gas powered appliance or fireplace, or a wood burning stove, install a carbon monoxide detector as a precaution to protect your family.
- Ensure that your home has working smoke alarms.
- NEVER bring a bar-b-que inside to cook with or to heat your home.

CONSTRUCTION ALERTS

Increased Construction Traffic Near Intersection of S. 188th Street & 42nd Avenue S.

Watch for increased traffic along eastbound S. 188th Street due to construction of several new homes at the Reserve at Angle Lake Subdivision.

Intersection Improvements at Military Road and S. 200th Street

Construction work by WSDOT is continuing on the Southbound I-5 interchange at Military Road S. and S. 200th Street. This work will widen and realign the intersection and install new traffic signals to allow for easier access between I-5 and, the Angle Lake Light Rail Station, and the City of SeaTac. Please plan alternate routes around the area if possible. Construction on 24th Avenue S. Overlay Project: S. 142nd Street to S. 128th Street

Construction is ongoing for the 24th Avenue S. Overlay Phase 2 project. This week, the Contractor completed its pavement grinding and is preparing the roadway for asphalt paving next week (weather dependent). The paving is scheduled to be completed within two days of starting. The Contractor will be working as late as 8:00 PM on these days to be able to complete paving within this two day window. The impact to drivers traveling through this area will be more significant during these paving days. The paving dates will be communicated prior to start of paving on the variable messaging signs throughout the project. Please use alternate routes if possible.

Construction on 32nd Avenue S. Sidewalk Project (S. 188th Street to S. 192nd Street) Nearing Completion



Construction is nearing completion for this project. Installation of sidewalk and paving were completed a few weeks ago. This week's work included hydroseeding to establish grass, restoration of disturbed areas, fence and signage installation, and driveway paving.

Connecting 28th/24th Avenue S. Project Milestone

Construction is rapidly moving along for the Connecting 28th/24th Avenue S. project. Work recently completed or ongoing includes:

- Installation of bridge abutments complete
- Installation of concrete curb and gutter, center median curb, and pre-level pavement along 24th Avenue S. (north of S. 208th Street) was completed
- Overhead utilities converted underground along 24th Avenue S. (north of S. 208th Street) ongoing
- Stabilization of exposed soils ahead of wet weather is ongoing
- · Utility connections ongoing

Today (October 7) the Contractor will be installing pre-cast concrete girders that will support the new roadway and bridge over the future SR 509 highway. This is significant milestone in the project and a represents the planning in partnership with WSDOT to have this roadway be forward compatible with SR509.

The SeaTac Police continue to participate in Washington Traffic Safety Commission (WTSC), Target Zero emphasis patrols. In the months of August and September, we staffed police officers on overtime funded by a grant from WTSC, to arrest impaired and dangerous drivers. The emphasis resulted in:

Dedicated Parking Enforcement / Pilot Program

The Police Department is piloting a parking enforcement effort which allows us to dedicate an officer to parking problems throughout the city. Reserve Deputy Robert Smith works approximately eight hours per week, conducting parking enforcement patrols throughout the City. Since the pilot began in September, he has worked eight emphasis sessions which resulted in 70 parking tickets and two impounded cars.

Homicide Suspect Arrested Without Incident

On October 5 at about 3:15 PM the suspect from the August 31, shooting homicide at the Motel 6, was taken into custody in Federal Way. King County Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Detectives, assisted by King County SWAT arrested him out of a private residence after a relentless investigation.

Police staff members are engaging with the kids, coaches and families in both settings. Light Rail Safety

With the opening of our new Angle Lake Light Rail Station, we thought this information was timely and helpful, especially for new transit users:

- Most robberies, thefts and pickpockets are surprise grab and runs, so be alert and aware of your surroundings at all times. Do not allow yourself to get caught up in your media devices in public settings.
- •Put your phone away when getting on and off the trains. The large number of people moving together during these moments can make you an easier target.



- •Avoid using your phones and tablets while seated near an exit door. A thief can easily grab these items and run away, perfectly timed with the train leaving the station.
- •Be alert and listen for train horns, remove ear buds and obey all traffic signals, signs and crossing gates.
- •Do not lean or walk out onto the tracks and hold onto your children when trains are arriving or departing.
- •Don't be afraid to report anything odd or suspicious to 911. You can be our eyes and ears of the city!
