

City Manager's Weekly Update March 17, 2017

The City Leadership Team Is Now Complete

Jeff Robinson has been appointed as the City's Community and Economic Development (CED) Director. Jeff has been serving as the Acting Director for the past year while CED Director Joe Scorcio was serving as Acting City Manager. There are no longer any Acting Directors in the City. Jeff has been with the City for more than 8 years and has consistently demonstrated solid leadership skills. Jeff's prior position as Economic Development Manager will be fully evaluated and likely changed before it is filled.

This strategic approach to vacancies is consistent with the steps that City administration has taken with position vacancies at all levels throughout the organization over the last year.

A New Beginning

The first major redevelopment project for the City Center in over two decades began on Wednesday morning with the start of the Jet Motel demolition project. The Jet Motel and its neighboring property, the Concourse Inn will both be removed to make room for two new hotels and a market rate apartment on the three acre site three blocks north of the light rail sky bridge. City Council members Campbell, Fernald, Forschler and Kwon were in attendance for the ceremonial sledge hammer swings and watched as the first pass of the heavy equipment began its work which should take about two weeks to complete.





Lou Development is building the nearly \$100 million project that includes a 242 room Hyatt Place and a 139 room Hyatt House, along with about 100 apartment units. All parking will be underground or on a pedestal and should set the stage for similar project to follow that will help transform this part of the City. The hotels are scheduled to be completed in early 2019 with the apartment to follow soon thereafter.

Public Works Project Updates Connecting 28th/24th Avenue S.

Project extends new roadway and non-motorized improvements from the intersection of S. 200th Street and 26th Avenue S. to the intersection of S. 208th Street and 24th Avenue S. It completes the gap in the 28th/24th corridor and provides an alternate north/south arterial to SR 99. It mitigates congestion and improves multi-modal access to the Angle Lake Light Rail Station in lieu of widening SR 99. The project is a regional partnership between SeaTac, Sound Transit, Port of Seattle, WSDOT and Des Moines. Access will enable development of adjacent properties to the highest & best use.

Update:

- Installation of wingwall panels on tunnel structure continues, 90% complete.
- Tunnel backfilling is on-going, to be completed by end of March.
- Installation of illumination poles is on-going.
- Patching of retaining walls at multiple locations.
- Site restoration is continuing landscaping, tree planting, and general tidying up. The planting window has been extended to end of March.
- Bridge deck pour is planned for the week of March 17th. Test slab poured on March 13.
- Continue erosion and sediment control.

2017 Overlay Project

The following roadways will be included in the 2017 overlay: 12th Place S. and 13th Avenue S. between S. 200th Street and S. 207th Street and S. 207th Street between 12th Place S. and 14th Avenue S.

Update:

60% plans/specs were distributed for review on March 13. The anticipated bid date for the project is late May.

Intersection of S. 160th Street and 42nd Avenue S.

Following concerns from residents regarding the accident history at the intersection of S. 160th Street and 42nd Avenue S., Public Works has completed the following steps to improve safety:

- Vegetation within the ROW has been removed to maximize site distance.
- Placards have been added to both east and west bound legs of S. 160th Street (below the stop signs) to caution drivers that cross traffic does not stop.
- Additionally, once weather allows, a new stop bar will be applied to eastbound S. 160th Street at the intersection.

Additional site distance related improvements to this intersection will occur this summer as part of sidewalk improvements along 42nd Avenue S. that the City of Tukwila is constructing.

S. 168th Street Stormwater System Improvements

Preliminary design has begun. Project is anticipated to bid in early June.

2017 Traffic Count Program

Collection of traffic counts has begun and will continue throughout the month of March.



Puget Sound Fire Authority Fire Chief Resigns

Puget Sound Fire Authority Fire Chief Jim Schneider tendered his resignation at Wednesday night's Governance Board meeting, effective Sept. 4, the fire authority reported Thursday.

Schneider joined the fire authority on April 8, 2002, and has brought about many changes and improvements to our department, including: international accreditation; becoming a regional fire authority; contracting with the city of SeaTac: rebranding/renaming process and other steps

in regionalization.

According to the fire authority, more information will become available as the process begins to find a successor to Schneider.

Electrical Panel Fire

No one was hurt the evening of Thursday, March 16 when a residential electrical panel caught fire in the 3700 block of S. 172 Street.

Two men were home at the time of the fire and attempted to put out the fire using a handheld fire extinguisher. When firefighters from Puget Sound Fire got on scene at approximately 5:40 PM, they found smoke and sparks coming from the panel.

Because the system was energized, firefighters stood by to keep the fire from spreading until Puget Sound Energy arrived and disconnected the power.

The fire was contained to the panel and the wall surrounding it, and is considered accidental.

In addition to Puget Sound Fire, a fire engine from the Tukwila Fire Department also responded to the call.
