## 2017 Good Neighbor Award Recipient

# City of SeaTac Announces 2018 Minimum Wage Adjustments

The City of SeaTac is announcing the mandatory annual adjustments to the City's Minimum Employment Standards Ordinance for Hospitality and Transportation Industry Employers.

2018 Minimum Wage: \$15.64 per hour

The increase in the living wage rate (1.93%) has been calculated using the consumer price index for urban wage earners and clerical workers, (CPI-W) for the twelve (12) months prior to September 1st as calculated by the United States Department of Labor. Therefore, in accordance with SeaTac Municipal Code (SMC) Section 7.45.050, the living wage rate in effect for hospitality and transportation employees within the City will increase to \$15.64, effective January 1, 2018.



# Public Works Project Updates 12th Place and 13th Avenue S. Overlay Project

The scope of this project includes pavement repair, asphalt paving and stormwater improvements on 12th Place S. and 13th Avenue S. between S. 200th Street and S. 207th Street and S. 207th Street between 12th Place S. and 14th Avenue S. Highline Water District (HWD) will be replacing all of their water lines and services within the project limits.

- 90% plans, specifications and estimate review is complete
- · A meeting to discuss review comments will be scheduled in October
- Construction is planned for March/April 2018

#### S. 168th Street Stormwater System Improvements

- Driveway culverts installed
- · Approximately 120 feet of storm pipe installed

#### **ADA (American Disability Act) Transition Plan**

Data collection is ongoing. A data collection interactive portal has been established to monitor progress.

#### **Permit Parking Program**

 Draft "Best Management Practices" document and matrix of proposed treatments is complete and should be ready for internal review on October 18

#### Military Road and S. 152nd Street

Improvements for this road reconstruction and safety project include construction of buffered bike lanes; curb and gutter; sidewalks; new pavement; installation of street lighting; upgraded and interconnected signalization with pedestrian crossings; construction of a right turn lane on eastbound S. 152nd Street; and the elimination of the skewed intersection at Tukwila International Blvd. and Military Road S. This project is scheduled for construction in the summer of 2018.

- Began preparation of figures for property owner outreach
- 30% Plans are scheduled for delivery on October 16

#### S. 166th Street Sidewalk Project

This Safe Routes to School Program grant funded project includes construction of sidewalks, curb and gutter, storm drainage facilities, installation of an enhanced crosswalk and radar speed feedback signs. This project is scheduled for construction in the summer of 2018.

- · Work on NEPA permit is ongoing.
- Storm design requirements and predesign are underway.
- Public meeting is scheduled for October 25.

#### 2018 Overlay Project

This project will reconstruct Military Road S. between S. 209th Street and the I-5 bridge. Work will include "rubbelization" of the existing concrete road in place and overlaying with hot mix asphalt, construction of storm water improvements, addition of pedestrian facilities and bicycle lanes, signal upgrades, roadway channelization, and permanent signing.

The construction contract has been fully executed and survey will begin this week

#### S. 200th Street/26th Avenue Intersection Project

The scope of this project includes the grind and overlay of the intersection at S. 200th Street and 26th Avenue S., installation of ADA compliant sidewalks and ramps, pedestrian signal upgrades, signal loop detectors and channelization.

 Council approved a motion to authorize a professional services contract with KPG at the October 10 Regular Council Session

#### **Pavement Condition Survey**

IMS Infrastructure Management Services LLC will be conducting a detailed inventory and condition rating of all city streets beginning October 16. The survey is scheduled to be complete by November 24.

# **Locals Presented with Appreciation Award for Assisting Deputy**

On September 28 at about 8:30 PM, a SeaTac Deputy stopped a vehicle at S. 188th Street/International Blvd. for a traffic violation. The Deputy saw the driver of the vehicle actively destroying narcotics evidence, as he approached the car. The deputy tried to stop the driver from doing this, which led to the driver getting out of the car and attacking the deputy. The deputy was punched in the face with a glancing blow, head-butted and backed into an iron fence. The driver, about twice the size of the Deputy, used his body to hold and crush the Deputy against the fence. The Deputy was unable to reach his radio to call for help. Two passersby saw that the Deputy was pinned and stopped to help. The first, Eugenio Soracco was coming out of the nearby convenience store and saw the stop from the beginning. He ran to help, asking the Deputy, "What do you want me to do?" The Deputy was able to direct him to grab the driver's legs from behind. At about the same time, local SeaTacpark.com shuttle driver Jim Tannehill, passed the scene and also saw that the Deputy was being crushed against the fence. He stopped and helped Soracco and the Deputy, get the driver into custody. The driver, apparently high on cocaine, was booked into King County Jail for Aggravated Assault and Violation of the Uniform Controlled Substance Act (narcotics). Neither the Deputy nor the driver was not seriously injured, thanks to the quick action of these two residents.

# Police News Continued... Alert Residents Inform Police of Suspicious Person

In the evening hours of September 1, several residents in the area of S. 179th Street/48th Avenue S., called police to report a man on a ladder, apparently working on a power line, but dressed strangely and with no visual markings to indicate that he was associated with a utility company. A SeaTac deputy responded and confirmed that there were no company markings on the car parked nearby and that the man on the ladder was dressed in shorts and basketball shoes, not typical of an authorized utility worker. The man appeared to be high or otherwise impaired and was reluctant to identify himself. His behavior was so erratic that the Deputy felt he needed to be handcuffed in order to safely continue the investigation. During this process, an unidentified resident/passerby helped the Deputy hold the man until additional deputies could arrive to help. It was ultimately determined that the man was a valid contract employee of a company hired to do utility work at that location, but his actions were not supported by the company. The man was transported to a local hospital for a mental health evaluation.

This is a great example of what "suspicious" looks like. A man who isn't dressed the part, doing work that is apparently unsupported by uniform or vehicle markings. Great call on the part of the residents who called 911. It is also another great example of a resident/passerby helping a deputy when he needed it. The men and women of the SeaTac Police sincerely appreciate that our residents care enough to offer physical assistance if it looks like we need
