City of SeaTac Announces 2018 Minimum Wage Adjustments

The City of SeaTac is announcing the mandatory annual adjustments to the City's Minimum Employment Standards Ordinance for Hospitality and Transportation Industry Employers.

2018 Minimum Wage: \$15.64 per hour

The increase in the living wage rate (1.93%) has been calculated using the consumer price index for urban wage earners and clerical workers, (CPI-W) for the twelve (12) months prior to September 1st as calculated by the United States Department of Labor. Therefore, in accordance with SeaTac Municipal Code (SMC) Section 7.45.050, the living wage rate in effect for hospitality and transportation employees within the City will increase to \$15.64, effective January 1, 2018.

Fire Station 47 Relocated

Fire Station 47 Apparatus and Crew Relocates

As of 9:00 AM on October 16, the Fire Station 47 crew and apparatus, which has been located at 3215 S. 152nd Street, has been relocated to Station 46 located at 3521 S. 170th Street. SeaTac.

The City undertook an extensive analysis of the various options for the future of Station 47 and due to its age and its overall condition, it was determined that Station 47 will operate from the Station 46 facility.

The station was built in 1966 by District #2 (Burien) and was originally staffed by volunteers. In 1976 the King County Medic 1 operated from the Station and following the incorporation of the City and the start of municipal fire services in 1991, the station has been staffed by City firefighters.

The site has been secured for future demolition and will be sold at some time in the future.



Public Works Project Updates

12th Place and 13th Avenue S. Overlay Project

The scope of this project includes pavement repair, asphalt paving and stormwater improvements on 12th Place S. and 13th Avenue S. between S. 200th Street and S. 207th Street and S. 207th Street between 12th Place S. and 14th Avenue S. Highline Water District (HWD) will be replacing all of their water lines and services within the project limits.

- 90% plans, specifications and estimate review is complete
- Construction is planned for March/April 2018

S. 168th Street Stormwater System Improvements

· Storm pipe and catch basin installation continues

ADA (American Disability Act) Transition Plan

- Data collection is complete.
- A public meeting is scheduled on November 9, 6:00 PM in the Council Chambers

Permit Parking Program

 Draft "Best Management Practices" document and matrix of proposed treatments is complete and should be ready for internal review by late October

Military Road and S. 152nd Street

Improvements for this road reconstruction and safety project include construction of buffered bike lanes; curb and gutter; sidewalks; new pavement; installation of street lighting; upgraded and interconnected signalization with pedestrian crossings; construction of a right turn lane on eastbound S. 152nd Street; and the elimination of the skewed intersection at Tukwila International Blvd. and Military Road S. This project is scheduled for construction in the summer of 2018.

- Continued preparation of figures for property owner outreach
- 30% Plans submitted on October 13

S. 166th Street Sidewalk Project

This Safe Routes to School Program grant funded project includes construction of sidewalks, curb and gutter, storm drainage facilities, installation of an enhanced crosswalk and radar speed feedback signs. This project is scheduled for construction in the summer of 2018.

- · Work on NEPA permit is ongoing.
- Topographic survey is complete
- Public meeting is scheduled for October 25 (See attached notice).

2018 Overlay Project

This project will reconstruct Military Road S. between S. 209th Street and the I-5 bridge. Work will include "rubbelization" of the existing concrete road in place and overlaying with hot mix asphalt, construction of storm water improvements, addition of pedestrian facilities and bicycle lanes, signal upgrades, roadway channelization, and permanent signing.

The design contract has been fully executed and survey has begun

S. 200th Street/26th Avenue Intersection Project

The scope of this project includes the grind and overlay of the intersection at S. 200th Street and 26th Avenue S., installation of ADA compliant sidewalks and ramps, pedestrian signal upgrades, signal loop detectors and channelization.

 Council approved a motion to authorize a professional services contract with KPG at the October 10 Regular Council Session, the contract is in routing for signing

Pavement Condition Survey

IMS Infrastructure Management Services LLC will be conducting a detailed inventory and condition rating of all city streets beginning October 16. The survey is scheduled to be complete by November 24.

POLICE NEWS



On October 11, SeaTac Street Crimes Detectives served a narcotics search warrant on a residence in the area of S. 166/35 Avenue S. They seized heroin, methamphetamine, crack cocaine, Oxycodone pills and \$3,500.00 cash.

On October 13, SeaTac Street Crimes Detectives served a narcotics search warrant on a residence in the area of Kent Des Moines Road/20 Avenue S. They seized 32 grams of heroin, 19 grams of methamphetamine, \$11,700 cash and 3 hand guns (two of which were stolen), body armor, ID cards in multiple names and other fraudulent documents.

Both investigations are on-going.

Assault at Local Coffee Shop Results in Felony Assault Charges

On August 27, an employee of a coffee shop was repeatedly assaulted by four patrons, after a dispute about service. An employee of a nearby pizza shop tried to intervene on behalf of the coffee shop employee. He was also assaulted. Using cell phone video and license plate information, Detective Wheeler was able to identify suspects. This week he filed felony assault charges against all four suspects. The victims are recovering from their injuries.

Police Officers Presented with Awards

During a staff meeting on October 16, three SeaTac Deputies were presented with Department achievement awards.

Deputy Alan Tag was presented with the Commander's Award for his work to manage, staff and schedule the Washington Traffic Safety Commission, Target Zero Emphasis program on behalf of the City of SeaTac. His careful management of the program has earned the City additional funding each year for the last two years.

Deputies Jacob Fritz, Michael Yamamoto and Hansen Hsu were each presented with the Life Saver Award for actions they took to prolong/save the lives of two people who had suffered cardiac arrest in the City of SeaTac. In two separate incidents, these deputies responded to assist the Fire Department and arrived first, with their issued Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs). They applied the AED and CPR until Fire/Medics could arrive and take over the efforts.
