Q4 ANNUAL DEMOGRAPHICS NARRATIVE (Kerstin)

In the 2018 year ANEW assisted 111 clients in neighboring cities with the assistance of funds you provided us and in conjunction with other funding sources. We were able to provide demographic information on 102 of these clients.

Looking at trends in the data, 36% of students were under the age of 25. This is important to point out because ANEW had an internal focus of outreaching, recruiting and enrolling students between the ages of 18-24 years old in 2018. This year we continued to see an increase in African-American and Hispanic/Latino clients this year, reaching 51%. As always serving Women and people of color is a large agency concentration for ANEW.

In June, ANEW acquired another 11-week pre-apprenticeship training program. With the addition of this program and its training facility in North Seattle we were able to expand where we offer training services and increase the amount of clients we can serve in a year.

ANEW's database system does not include immigrant status, language status, military status, or homelessness status when pulling reports. In addition, the database currently allows one address, therefore when a client moves, and we update their address in the database we no longer have access to their previous address. We are working on updating our database system over the next few months to be able to provide this information in the future.

In 2018 we saw a significant increase in the number of very low and low income households. This year the EA program was able to serve 78 more households than in 2017, which consisted of 1147 unduplicated individuals, an increase of 286 from 2017. There were 26 households that, due to an unidentifiable database issue, could not be identified as homeless or housed, We are working to identify that issue so we can resolve it. It's worth noting that there was an increase in every age range category except in the 25-34 range, as well as a significant increase in the number of females served this year. We also saw the number of multi-racial clients more than double from 2017.

City funding has been critical to helping us ensure that South King County's most vulnerable residents-low-income children of color with special needs—are able to receive the interventions they need to improve their physical, social-emotional, adaptive, cognitive, and communicative development—and that their parents/caregivers are able to receive the parenting education, mentoring, and support they need to better support their child's development. This has been especially valuable for our center-based program for children up to age 18. As one of the few pediatric therapy centers in KingCounty that accepts Medicaid and serves both children aged birth to 3 and children older than 3, Children's Therapy Center continues to see a significant increase in the number of children being referred for services.

As we reported last year, with the price of housing continuing to skyrocket in the Puget Sound region, more families are moving to South King County, due to the relative affordability of housing. However, the availability of affordable housing is shrinking, and many families are spending a greater percentage of their already-modest incomes on housing. This is putting more families at risk of experiencing homelessness. We have continued to see an uptick in families reporting that they are staying with friends/family or couch-surfing. While they are not homeless in the traditional sense (living on the street or in a shelter), they still lack a stable housing environment. As such, we believe that the number of families reporting being homeless is much lower than the actual number of families.

Trends for 2018:

- 1. Survivors who identify as immigrants have been very reluctant to reach out for support. It took a lot of outreach by our advocate (who herself is bi-cultural) to build trust within those communities. Because of these efforts, we have been able to reach some folks. However, we know that there are many survivors who are so afraid of the government response that they continue to live with fear and abuse. We have been looking for ways to bring our advocacy into those communities in the safest way possible including being more creative around mobile appointments, etc.
- 2. In this housing market we are finding that survivors are at greater risk for losing their housing. This is a huge struggle because there has been historically little money for housing retention. Most people need to meet the HUD requirements for homelessness in order to access the funding available for ending homelessness. This means that once the survivor leaves the relationship, she is much more dependant on child support, etc. and allows the abuser to have much more financial control given withholding payment of child support puts the survivor and their children at great risk for eviction causing the survivor to capitulate to the abuser. Lack of housing stability is one of the main reasons survivors stay with an abusive partner. The requirements needed to access the funding is really frustrating given that it is much cheaper (on the entire system) to prevent an eviction in the first place than to house a homeless family and establish a new lease (especially for people with evivctions on their record). Domestic Violence advocates and housing advocates have worked hard with funders to recognize this issue and we have high hopes that restrictions on this type of funding will ease in 2019.

Explanations regarding the demographic data:

- 1. We only ask if the client themselves are former or current military (not their spouse/partner). We have tried to train staff to ask about partner/spouse especially if they are the parent of the child. However, we may need to change our intake forms to better answer this question.
- 2. Our intake (data collection system) is coordinated with InfoNet (the state system) and as such, ethnicity is tracked separately from race. This is why those numbers may look elevated for this report.

Trends:

- 1. Confidential emergency shelter is perhaps the most pressured resource in our community. 2018 saw the closing of two shelters in our community, leaving DAWN's shelter as one of the last DV focused confidential shelters standing. The numbers for the turn away rate for DV confidential shelter for King County (Nov. 2018) is 57 to 1. This means that for every family housed we said no to 57 other families (or single adults) who would have otherwise screened in had we had the space. This has dramatically changed the way that our advocates work with survivors.
- a. It changes safety planning- because accessing shelter space is rare, how can survivors be more safe in their current living situation, are they able to travel away from this community, are they able to stay with friends or family, etc.
- b. It changes the way advocates and survivors look at other resources. Advocates have become very adept at creating relationships with non DV housing programs and working with those programs to increase safety for survivors. An example of this is that we may receive a call on our crisis line from someone in a lethal situation. If we do not have an opening in our shelter, we may use motel vouchers to get them safe for a night or two, then the advocates will work their connections to get the survivor housed with a different agency if possible. For our reporting, it looks like we "turned away" the client, but in fact we were able to get them housed safely outside of our agency. Unfortunately, those situations are not reflected in our reporting to you, the cities. It looks like we didn't serve your residents even though it was because of the connection with our program that ultimately got them into a safe place.
- c. It takes a lot of additional time to serve people in these situations (because of the lack of resources) and the constant toll on our staff of having to say "no" to people has been significant.
- 2. We have found that a significant need for many folks is actually a safe space to store their things rather than a need for shelter. They may be able to bunk with family or friends, but have nowhere to store their belongings. We are looking at ways to meet this need and if anyone from the cities has any ideas, we would be open to meeting with you to discuss your ideas!
- 3. DAWN is one of the few shelters that accepts pets. We know that for many survivors, their pets are a part of their family and the research shows that abusers harm pets as a way to control/influence their partner's decisions. We have had a lot of success with our shelter program accepting pets. Where we struggle is when we need to use emergency motel vouchers as we have found that motels are much less pet friendly.
- 4. One last trend that we have seen this year is in family size. Survivors with large families face an even greater barrier in accessing shelter because most rooms are set up to accommodate 3-4 people. Several times this year, we have needed to use two rooms for one family. This means that there is less space available to others. Also, larger families are harder when looking for permanent housing, thus these families tend to stay longer at our shelter. Given the pressures of this housing market, we are unsure as to how to alleviate this issue.

Trends for 2018:

- 1. Survivors who identify as immigrants have been very reluctant to reach out for support. It took a lot of outreach by our advocate (who herself is bi-cultural) to build trust within those communities. Because of these efforts, we have been able to reach some folks. However, we know that there are many survivors who are so afraid of the government response that they continue to live with fear and abuse. We have been looking for ways to bring our advocacy into those communities in the safest way possible including being more creative around mobile appointments, etc.
- 2. In this housing market we are finding that survivors are at greater risk for losing their housing. This is a huge struggle because there has been historically little money for housing retention. Most people need to meet the HUD requirements for homelessness in order to access the funding available for ending homelessness. This means that once the survivor leaves the relationship, she is much more dependant on child support, etc. and allows the abuser to have much more financial control given withholding payment of child support puts the survivor and their children at great risk for eviction causing the survivor to capitulate to the abuser. Lack of housing stability is one of the main reasons survivors stay with an abusive partner. The requirements needed to access the funding is really frustrating given that it is much cheaper (on the entire system) to prevent an eviction in the first place than to house a homeless family and establish a new lease (especially for people with evivctions on their record). Domestic Violence advocates and housing advocates have worked hard with funders to recognize this issue and we have high hopes that restrictions on this type of funding will ease in 2019.

Explanations regarding the demographic data:

- 1. We only ask if the client themselves are former or current military (not their spouse/partner). We have tried to train staff to ask about partner/spouse especially if they are the parent of the child. However, we may need to change our intake forms to better answer this question.
- 2. Our intake (data collection system) is coordinated with InfoNet (the state system) and as such, ethnicity is tracked separately from race. This is why those numbers may look elevated for this report.

1. This year, DAWN has been evaluating the efficacy of our prevention program; especially looking at the curriculum through the lens of individual family work versus group family work. We piloted the idea of bringing programming from our prevention program to children/youth at the same time their mothers were attending support group. Historically, we provided child care and no programming. We saw this as a wasted opportunity and wanted to see how modifying pieces of the curriculum into group work would be received by the children and their mothers. We found it to be a huge success. However, one of the strengths of our prevention program is the individual family time spent with the advocate to talk about individualized safety planning, conflict resolution skills building within the family unit, and specialized post-separation advocacy for the adult survivor. We realized that to have the best outcomes, we need to create a hybrid program for families attending support group. In 2019, we are going to pilot this family program in that we will have about half of the curriculum taught in the group format and the other half individualized for the families in their homes. We will be doing this IN ADDITION to the regular In Home Program. We look forward to analyzing those outcomes and sharing the results with you.

Food bank service figures declined 5% overall, as a strong economy helped families with jobs and destruction of low-income housing and local rent increases forced many clients out of the area. We continue to serve a diverse community that includes a large percentage of children (41%) and seniors (15%). Current trends include an increase in the number of single-person homes and a large increase in the number of seniors being served over recent years. The only other demographic changes of note include: 1) the number of immigrants has declined by 2%, due to displaced families; and 2) more clients identify as Latino, while the number of Asians has declined and Caucasians has increased due to the classification of Iranian Arabs as Caucasian instead of Asian (in accordance with United Way demographic protocols). Please note that we are still trying to help Highline College staff extract data for students served at Highline Pantry, so the total numbers served here and the demographic information does not reflect those service numbers.

Our care teams conduct outreach (phone calls, postcards, additional appointment slots, flyers, diabetes education classes) to engage and inform patients with diabetes about self-management techniques and to support them in maintaining regular check-ups.

Report Narrative

HealthPoint, Primary Medical Care, Quarter 4 2018

HealthPoint is strengthening city communities and improving people's health by delivering quality health care services, breaking down barriers and providing access to all. During the fourth quarter of 2018, we completed an annual health insurance enrollment campaign to help patients enroll in Medicare Advantage plans. We enrolled 559 patients to receive additional benefits such as stipends for over-the-counter medical needs, saving costs for patients and promoting better self-care. HealthPoint's Tukwila clinic was the highest performing clinic for enrolling patients over the eight-week campaign. HealthPoint's Redmond clinic, Renton clinic, Midway clinic and SeaTac clinic also exceeded enrollment goals.

HealthPoint's focus on improving hypertension this year has been recognized by the American Heart Association. HealthPoint received a Target BP Gold Status from the American Heart Association in recognition of our achievements in helping patients control their blood pressure.

For **Bothell, Kirkland and Kenmore** residents, HealthPoint's Bothell health center focused on making sure children in Bothell, Kirkland and Kenmore received a well-child visit during fourth quarter. This clinic outperformed all others in this measure, with an 83% completion rate for children age 3-6 receiving a well-child exam.

For **Burien** young people, HealthPoint's Burien school-based health center at Evergreen high school served just over 140 kids during fourth quarter. In addition to treating student for acute illnesses, such as flu, and chronic conditions, including asthma and diabetes, our Burien SBHC focused on prevention, early intervention and risk reduction, counseling students on healthy habits and how to prevent injury, violence and other threats.

For **Redmond**, **Bellevue**, **Issaquah** and **Sammamish** residents, HealthPoint's Redmond health center focused on children in Redmond, Bellevue, Issaquah and Sammamish receiving recommended immunizations against childhood diseases. This clinic's data show that 87% of two-year-old pediatric patients received their immunizations on schedule.

For **Renton** residents, HealthPoint's Renton clinic has exceeded its goal for hypertension control during fourth quarter, with 70% of adult patients with hypertension having their blood pressure under control at their last blood pressure reading. Our Renton health center used Lean process improvement to reduce lead time between uncontrolled and controlled hypertensive patients, emphasizing the role of pharmacy staff, screening for barriers to care, and increasing visibility of the patient's hypertension plan for the patient's entire care team, including behavioral health and social support services.

For **Renton** high school students, HealthPoint's school-based health center at Renton high school provided students with primary medical care, behavioral health care, health education and promotion, substance abuse counseling and nutrition education.

For **Federal Way** residents, HealthPoint's Federal Way health center spent fourth quarter focused on increasing awareness about mental health during the holiday season. Our Federal Way health center exceeded the goal for screening all adult patients and creating a follow-up plan with all patients screening positive for depression. The focus on mental health during fourth quarter is important

because the holiday season and winter blues can be stressful, especially for those with depression, anxiety and other mental health disorders.

For **SeaTac and Burien** residents, HealthPoint's SeaTac clinic achieved the best results of all HealthPoint clinics for breast, cervical and colon cancer screenings. Our SeaTac health center enrolled 100 patients in the Breast, Cervical, & Colon Health Program (BCCHP), which is twice the number that enrolled last year. BCCHP provides free cancer screenings and care for low-income patients who lack insurance coverage.

For **SeaTac** youth, HealthPoint's SeaTac school-based health center at Tyee Educational Complex provided preventive and comprehensive medical, behavioral and social services for youth in SeaTac. During fourth quarter, this clinic focused on preventive care and reproductive health education and services.

For **Tukwila** residents, HealthPoint's Tukwila health center is leading all clinics in overall quality improvement measures, meeting 80% of all measures. This clinic has conducted rapid process improvement projects that have led to improved performance, such as training medical assistants, nurses and providers in the use and interpretation of spirometry tests to more accurately identify patients with asthma, and using patient engagement coordinators trained in motivational interviewing techniques to increase effectiveness of centralized reminder calls to patients.

For **Kent, Covington and Des Moines** residents, HealthPoint's Midway health center and Kent health center both focused fourth quarter on improving care for patients with social needs that impede their ability to get and stay healthy. Our Midway clinic is transforming processes to create a way for support staff to better partner with provider teams in caring for these patients by standardizing how information on social determinants is collected and where it is held. Front desk staff and medical assistants will leverage current scheduling and reminder call processes to schedule care plan appointments with assessors. The health assessors (behavioral health providers, nurses and nutritionists) will conduct 30-minute meetings with patients and use a standardized tool to assess their unique needs, including access to stable housing, food insecurity, financial strain and poor social support (social isolation, loneliness, etc.). The health assessors will document the information on the patient's Care Plan in the patient's shared medical record, where it can be referenced by the patient's medical and dental provider teams. The Year of Care will keep track of patients and attend to their overall health needs at every encounter, by phone and in person throughout the year, not just when they are in front of the doctor. A patient with hypertension, for example, will receive accurate blood pressure readings during his or her dental visit.

HealthPoint's Kent clinic served more patients than any other clinic. Indeed, our Kent clinic is the busiest of all clinics, with a dedicated and tireless staff committed to keeping up with the high demand for services. Our Kent clinic met 80% of all HealthPoint 2018 quality measures—a truly impressive feat of teamwork and focus.

Also for **Kent and Covington** residents, HealthPoint will be opening its first urgent care clinic in Kent in January 2019. The new urgent care clinic will be located in MultiCare Health System's new medical building at 219 State Avenue. The clinic will open in January 2019 and will welcome everyone in the community regardless of ability to pay for services. When patients come to our urgent care clinic and do not have primary care, we will connect them to our HealthPoint Kent clinic a block away. The new urgent care clinic will relieve some of the high demand at our HealthPoint Kent clinic, where there can

be up to a two-week wait for an appointment. Our new urgent care clinic will offer same-day care with no appointment needed. We expect to provide around 19,000 visits during our first year. The new urgent care clinic will hold a Community Open House on Saturday, January 12 from 11 a.m. -2 p.m. with tours, food, children's activities, live music, and remarks from Kent Mayor Dana Ralph, MultiCare CEO Bill Robertson, and HealthPoint CEO Tom Trompeter.

The Highline food bank distributed 854,584 Lbs. of food in 2018 Valued at \$ 1,388,081 dollars per Wa. State Food Coalitions valuations. This tells us that every client leaving our food bank was able to save themselves \$60.31 from their grocery bill in food costs. Therfore if a family of 4 were to come in for food at the food bank they could save over \$240.00 of food cost per month by coming in just one time per month. This saving does increase if they come in more that once per month which many of our families do.

Our clients are given a 4-page form to fill out on their first visit. The info is entered into our computers. We then are able to extapolate info thru out the year for reports and make needed changes if a clients situation change. We then record every time a client accesses us for service thru out the year. The Lbs. of Food distributed are arrived by our inventory system, which provides an accurate count of the pounds of food that come in and go out thru our food bank monthly. Each client is provided with very nutritious food during each visit which has been approved by the SKC Food Coalition to be what is known as the standard minumum unit of service. The food is chosen by the client in a self select distribution system.

Our Numbers were down quite a bit over the year. We had 1285 unduplicated households representing 3802 individuals which visited multiple times during the year to give us 23,105 total vistits for the year. The good news for these people was that the amount of food was about the same as last year (851,584Lbs) meaning the clients got almost 37 pounds of food per person per visit. Once again I have entered numbers for Normandy Park in the Other King County section along with homeless who don't identify with a city. Our backpack program for local schools continues to go on although the numbers are down here too as we are only doing about 105 per week this year, dpwn from 125 last year. Prince of Peace Church is continuing to provide hotmeals on the 1st Tuesday of each month with our support. Our Garden has produced about 2300 Lbs of fresh organically grown produce this year and the number of local gardners who bring us the surplus has continued to increase. One of my pick up drivers informed me today that they are putting their house up for sale and not sure where they will be moving to. They told me the taxes which have topped 8,000 per year have become just to much and they are looking to downsize. They have been living in their home in Seahurst for 48 years. They are hoping to stay somewhere in the area but aren't sure if it will be possible. I really think this has been going on for a couple of years now as older folks in the community are being priced out because they are on fixed incomes. It's a sad reality of the times. I've also continued to get stories from clients that they are having to move because of rent increases. Lastly I will say that the client numbers obviously have been trending down because more people are employed and not needing to come in for service as much as they used to.

In 2018 the majority of the individuals served by PATH were Caucasian women between the ages of 35-54 years old, which is a change from the past several years. The demographic shift within clients served is likely related to the increase in day centers and shelter services in the region specifically set aside for women and family. We continued to see an increase in the number of individuals 55 years old and above, with one individual over the age of 75. Our team saw an increase in individuals willing to disclose that they have a disability, which could be related to our team continuing to complete VI-SPDAT assessments on the residents they work with.

PATH worked with individuals in 8 cities, one of which (Maple Valley) is listed under "Other King County" portion of the demographic workbook. This year we unable to serve the same number of communities we had in previous years due in part to having a smaller team, and being short-staffed for a several month period of time.

Immigration data issues: Because such a high proportion of clients choose not to disclose their immigration status, please keep in mind that this data is largely inaccurate.

Militaray data issues: Currently, we only record whether someone is a veteran of the armed services. We do not record whether someone is the spouse or dependent of someone in the military.

Auburn - We worked with a 13 trailer mobile home park in Auburn that is going to be condemned due to the egregious conditions of the property (electrical issues; rat infestation; water leaks; fire hazards). Eleven of the trailers are owned by the park owner and rented out; they had been previously condemned, but the landlord rented them out anyways to the tenants. Since the conditions are so horrendous, the landlord is supposed to pay for the tenants to relocate. We are helping the tenants procure the relocation assistance from the landlord and connecting the tenants with other resources to help them relocate.

Kent - We worked with a fifty-unit building for the elderly that had been receiving \$500 bills for bedbug fumigation costs. This is illegal as the problem was an ongoing issue and the tenants are not responsible for building-wide bed bug occurrences. Since the tenants are seniors and on fixed income, the charges were also unaffordable. We reached out to the tenants and got the landlord to rescind the notices.

Issaquah - A subsidized, low-income building of 36 units experienced sharp rent increases of \$600-\$800 per unit and were receiving harassing notices from the property manager, who was telling tenants their 18 year-old children had to leave the premises since they were now adults (although they were still in high school). We worked with the tenants to forward their grievances and were able to get the notices rescinded and the rent increases reduced and gradually phased in. There was a

This information reflects that of our classes hosted in SeaTac and Tukwila. Of the 141 people served, 44% are SeaTac residents and 26% are Tukwila residents. The next highest population, 9%, of the people we served are technically Seattle residents, however the majority of them live just over the city line and they are participants and consider themselves part of the SeaTac, Tukwila, and Burien communities.

For household income, we used the HUD description of very low income which is \$48,000 or below for a family of four. With that in consideration, 94% of the households we served that listed an annual income on their registration form identified their household as receiving a very low household income. That being said, 59% of the households we served did not list an annual income. We believe that a few different factors are in play here: our students fill out their registration form on their first day of class and listing an annual household income is fairly personal information to provide to a complete stranger, especially considering that the service we provide is not at all dependent on their income; another factor to consider is the level of English comprehension that students come in with, annual income isn't something usually covered in a basic language course, so even if a student comes in with a basic handling on the English language, this may not be something they're familiar with; and a final factor to consider is that the majority of our students are women who stay home with their children while their husbands work and they may not know what their household's annual income is. As we've seen year after year, we serve a high majority of women (80%) and we continue to believe this is, as previously mentioned, because they are usually the ones at home with the kids while their husbands are at work, another (related) reason we believe we serve such a high majority of women is that we offer free childcare while the parents are in class.

Determining disability or military service is a challenge for us because these aren't questions that we ask on our registration form. We've considered adding these questions to our form, but we really want to keep it as simple as possible. Especially for students with a more basic handle of English, a registration form with a large amount of questions (seemingly unrelated to what they think an English

We do reading/writing and speaking assessments at the beginning and end of each term, but having open enrollment means that we often get new students in the middle of the term and most of our students have other responsibilities that don't allow them to attend each class, so we are often missing a number of students when we perform our ending assessments as well as our student feedback surveys.

As mentioned in service reports, we are seeing an increase in households that are overburdened financially, meaning they are paying well above 30% of income for housing and utility costs. Some households are paying 50 - 75% of income for housing related costs.

For many of these households the crisis they face is more chronic than acute. With such a large portion of income going for housing-related costs, it is often small events and miscalculations that cause housing instability. These unexpected costs would be a minor inconveniene for someone with a higher income. For many of the households coming to MSC, it can mean the difference between being overburdened but housed and experiencing homelessness. Studies shows that the cost of homelessness and housing instability reaches far beyond the devastating personal costs (financial, physical and mental) for families and individuals, but also for communities, resulting in higher financial costs on community resources (emergency rooms, public safety, and courts) as well as intangible costs.

Our team felt this city was another city that the homeless population goes through rather than staying. Over the year the team spent a lot of time at the Renton and the Highlands Library where they were able to connect with young people there but as time went on, they saw fewer and fewer people frequenting the library. There has been a decrease in the amount of people the team are seeing on the streets and this could be due to the extreme weather that we have had over the year but also they could be finding resources they need in other cities. The team is continuing to try and get MOU's with the schools so they can be in the schools connecting with young people through that avenue. One new thing the team wanted to offer was a Mobile Drop in to anyone in their age range at the Renton Library in hopes to connect with even more people. Once a week a study room in the library is reserved for 2 hours where individuals can come up and talk to the team about services and receive basic needs essentials and case management referrals if they identify wanting support. So far, it has been hard to promote Mobile Drop In but with the help of the library, there is hope to receive more publicity and awareness. For the year we met all our service units except extended connections. We exceeded our contact goal by 95 contacts, exceeded our bundle items goal by 23, and were short 3 extended connections. Thank you for your continuous support over the years- we couldn't be able to do the work without it!

Their trust in the outreach worker and our agency in non-existent at the beginning, therefore the information they give us is limited. Tukwila

Tukwila continues to be a city that the homeless population is drawn to for services. The police department was extremely helpful in allowing the team to go on ride alongs to get connected with the young people that they encounter. It was a more ideal situation to have the outreach team with the LE rather than just the LE approaching them. The Tukwila Snack Pack program has also been a great place for our team to connect with young people and get them connected to additional services on an individual and family level. Our team will continue to provide outreach services in Tukwila. For 2018, the team met all of their annual goals. They exceeded their contacts goal by 201 contacts, exceeded their bundle items goal by 243 items, and met our extended connection by getting 3 extended connections. Thank you for your continuous support over the years- we couldn't be able to do the work without it!

Burien

Burien was by far the most challenging city to connect with people in their age range. Our team built a strong relationship with Transform Burien over the year and noticed a high number of adult experiencing homelessness who frequent that establishment. Being a constant presence in the city was a goal of the team and they achieved that as they were able to build relationships with many people but not everyone fit the age range they were looking for. This relationship made it easier though to connect with them again if they saw them on the streets to help them locate where the young adult homeless population was in the community. Another challenge for the street outreach team this year due to the turnover within the agency but also not getting connected with the right service providers early enough. Once the team made those vital connections in the community with the police department and other mobile outreach teams, they were able to compile their efforts and get connected with more youth and young adults. Aside from the difficulties, the team continued to build relationships with the schools in the community to engage young people that way. The team was also able to get connected with the King County Sheriff's office for ride alongs in hard to reach areas that may not have been safe for the team to go to alone. In the New Year, the team is hoping to start a mobile drop in service with Transform Burien where they will be present every week for 2 hours at a time. For 2018 we exceeded our contacts goal by 208 contacts, exceeded our bundle items goal by 233 items, and came just under our extended connection goal of 15 by only having 7 extended connections. The work in Burien will continue through 2019! Thank you for your continuous support over the years- we couldn't be able to do the work without it!

Covington

The homeless population in Covington is not visible on the streets, per the team, therefore making it challenging to locate and connect with that population. The team made a great effort in connecting with the police department in hopes they could help guide them in the right direction but the effort was not reciprocated on the other end. Aside from the challenge, the team continued to try and build their relationships with the librarians, churches, and the Covington Storehouse. The CS was a great resource as the team could provide or offer services that the CS didn't provide. The team will continue to try and build relationships with the schools and school counselors but it will be dependent on MOU's and how quickly they can be approved. Towards the end of the quarter, the team noticed that there were less homeless/at-risk youth attending the library and began seeing more families and older adults. For 2018-the team exceeded their annual goal for contacts by 87 contacts, exceeded their bundle items goal by 33 items, and came just short of their extended connections goal of 5 by getting 4. There are multiple barriers when working with students at Chinook and Tyee. One of the barriers is Marc, Case Manager at both schools has been receiving multiple referrals from both of the school's social worker. Unfortunately, he can only accept 8. He currently has 7 and he has been actively pursuing a few referred youth who are difficult to locate and are unresponsive. Some students are currently not attending school and the other half are but constantly skipping class. With Marc's current schedule to meet with students during school hours are limited from 2pm-3pm. He has also the advantage to meet with students after 3 pm and weekends which makes it another barrier for students. While Marc can only have 8 students in his caseload, he is looking for a student who can best be supported based on Marc's skillset.

Another barrier is culture and connection. At Chinook Middle School, there is 38% Hispanics/ Latino, and at Tyee, there is 40% of Hispanics/ Latino. That being said, Marc, as a Filipino American has been having a hard time connecting with students in that race. One of the barriers is, finding a Spanish interpreter to communicating with their parents. Marc has found other alternative ways to communicate with parents via email and using google translator but still has that barrier along the way of not being able to communicate what Safe Futures is all about and how they can trust our program.

Another barrier is regarding students who are involved in gangs, especially Hispanic/ Latino gangs. Marc has grown up around Asian gang members who are easier to get through to compared to youth in Hispanic/ Latino gangs. It's a significant challenge to get a student out of the gangs with no relationship to the adults in those gangs. With many barriers around that alone, it can be challenging at a time for Marc to connect with Hispanic/ Latino students who are embedded in their culture.

SafeFutures is working on creating more collaboration points with our three Spanish speaking staff to

This year, New Futures had an opportunity to return to our former site at Alturas in Burien. It has been almost six years when we closed our center due to funding. We were able to partner with the City of Burien, the leasing managers and owners to sign a two-year lease in the hopes of building community and developing youth programming for the students and families living in Alturas. Currently we have after-school programming for 30 youth grades 1- 12 located in a two-bedroom unit in the heart of the apartment complex. We are looking for partnership and grant opportunities that will allow us to expand our space and staff in order to serve the over 2,500 individuals living in the complex. Since Alturas is not a King County Housing facility there are limited protections we can offer the tenants when it comes to evictions. We have support funding and advocacy, to mitigate hardships. We continue to partner with other organizations to bring technology and the arts as part of our after-school enrichment program. GOKiC (Geeking Out Kids of Color) continues to teach our elementary and middle school youth coding and robotics, we also have Arts Corps' teaching artists visit three of our sites to provide, dance, theatre, and visual arts programming. This year we provided 34 weeks of academic programming and 7 weeks of summer programming. Next year we are reducing our summer programming to six weeks but will operate 5 days out of the week. Due to loss of some private funding and reduction in city funding, we needed to retstructure our staffing. Our program coordiantors, who previously were working 36 hours a week will be reduced to 28 hours a week starting 2019. We continue to solicit funding and advocate in increasing our city funding as supposed to reducing our funding in order to continue quality programming to cover over 200 students. It is difficult, as other non-profit organizations in South Seattle (SeaTac, Burien) are experiencing, to secure multi-year funding in these areas.
