In 2019 we did not see an increase in the amount of households or individuals that we served, mostly because of our staffing changes that happened in July with one manager leaving and a new manager coming on. But what we did see was an increase in in people served ages 35-54 compared to years past. We also noticed that overall we served less clients who came in literally homeless which means that more of our clients were coming in with housing, but facing eviction. The major number that stood out to us was that 79% of the clients that we served were very low income, which is larger than any percentage in past years.

There were 42 householes total that, due to an unidentified database issue, could not be identified as housed or homeless and we are working to resolve that within our agency. There are also no numbers to show families who have had a family member or the bread winner of the family deported, but when meeting with clients we saw this come up a number of times in 2019 for the first time.

Disability rates are high for older adults (38 percent in King County) and even higher for older adults living in poverty. (Area Plan 2020-2023, Aging and Disability Services). One hundred percent of VS clients have a functional disability that prevents them from completing one or more activities of daily living.

Living in

poverty makes it challenging to access appropriate medical care. According to the Aging and Disability Services (Area Plan 2020-2023, ADS), nine percent of older adults in King County live in poverty. Eighty-nine percent of VS clients served by VS have a very low income (2018 HUD Income Guidelines). The average monthly income for a VS client is \$1071. For adults who do not qualify for paratransit, but who are too frail to walk to and wait at fixed route bus stops, access to medical care and food can be difficult and needs sometimes go unmet. Clients who fall into this transportation gap benefit greatly from door through door volunteer transportation. In 2019, 129 clients were provided rides to medical appointments, the grocery store, the food bank, and to complete other essential tasks. Sixty seven percent of clients surveyed reported that they were better able to deal with their health status because of their volunteer's assistance. Seventy one percent reported feeling less isolated and more connected to their community due to their volunteer, and 88% reported an improvement in attitude and mental health. Ninety-eight percent reported that their volunteer's assistance has been helpful in enabling them to stay in their home.

R: Successes: In 2019, we have helped over 1200 families find child care providers and help paying for child care. Our Family Center has directly impacted these families lives by connecting them to licensed high quality child care. By doing this we are creating loving, caring, nurturing relationships between children and caregivers which will show positive outcomes for school success and Kindergarten readiness as well as later life success for all residents.

Challenges: Even with child care subsidy program funding from the state and from the cities of Auburn, Bellevue, Redmond and Kent families are still struggling to pay for child care with the high cost of living in our area. Families are having to make difficult choices between leaving the workforce to care for young children and/or not being able to pay for basic needs around shelter, food and clothing. If they do qualify for state subsidy, there can be a lack of child care spaces available due to child care provider business needs around number of private pay spots paying higher rates than state subsidy rates. This makes it a competitive market for some with the most resources available, leaving those families furthest from resource behind at a critical time in their child's lives, the first five years.

Goals: In Bellevue, outreach to Crossroads and the Bellevue School District has directly improved our numbers meeting our goal for families in the City of Bellevue this quarter. We will continue these outreach efforts in 2020, by attending in person quarterly resource fair events as well as mailing outreach materials to agencies and schools. We are launching a google ad campaign for the month of January, hoping to serve even more families with referral lists to licensed child care providers and resource around help paying for child care or other financial assistance for families depending on their situation and needs.

TA: This has been a very busy year with a lot of changes for the providers and the families they serve. With the Department of Child Youth & Families introducing the new WAC (Foundational Quality Standards for Early Learning Programs) this year has been a little overwhelming for providers. We have seen some providers embrace the changes and get on board and we are seeing some providers struggling. All of the providers handbooks have to be updated and we are supporting them with the updates. We have been having help sessions, phone conversations and sending out emails to explain to the providers the new changes to the WAC. We have even went out to sites and helped them at their program with the new rules and regulations along with their handbooks. We have updated a lot of the providers handbooks. Some of the providers are updating and making changes to their handbooks on their own which is totally a success. They have been calling when they have questions but they are trying to make the updates with our guidance.

We have also been supporting the licensed providers that are not in Early Achievers with their environments including what materials and supplies they need. We have went out to programs to help set up their environment and to support them with organizing the children's file, staff files and required postings etc.

Something else we have been doing is supporting potential providers that have been going through the pre-licensing process. That process has also changed this year and we are getting more potential providers needing more help/support with the licensing application and process now that everything is electronic. Our English second language learners are needing a lot of our support with the application process and understanding what everything means. The majority of the providers we have been supporting this past year with the licensing process are in the process of being licensed or have become licensed child care providers.

Unfortunately meeting the deliverables for Bellevue has been a challenge. Some of the providers are in Early Achievers and have a coach so they do not need our help/support. We have diligently been trying to meet the deliverables by making phone calls, emails and going out to the providers programs offering help/support if needed. We have let them know we are available to help them with any child care questions or concerns they have. We will continue to reach out to the Bellevue providers and offer help/support to them with whatever they need. Some of the ways we will be offering support is through on-site visits, emails, US Postal, post cards and a quarterly email to all the Bellevue providers.

TR: A success we are celebrating this quarter is meeting and exceeding the goals of 13 out of the 14 suburban cities. A significant increase in training attendance has helped us achieve our goals. We developed and led some new training topics that we will continue to offer in 2020. In October we held our Fall Child Care Conference at Highline College and were excited to have 232 registered participants. This conference increased our training hours in Tukwila (which had been 0 for the second and third quarter) and allowed us to meet our training goal for the year for this city.

Our biggest challenge this quarter was not increasing the number of training hours in Bellevue. It has been difficult to figure out how to get providers from that city to attend our trainings. To help figure out where providers are attending trainings and how they find out about trainings, we have developed a survey with these and other questions. We asked providers at our Fall Child Care Conference to complete the survey and this data is still being analyzed. We are hoping the information will help us figure out how to meet our training goal in Bellevue.

Next year, we will continue to host trainings at our Redmond office. Our Spring Child Care Conference will be held at Shoreline Community College in April. We hope the location will lead to a higher number of participants attending from Bellevue.

We will continue to market directly to Bellevue providers through email blasts, Facebook, and by word of mouth (using our Early Achievers Coaches).

For the data on demographics: This report is quite unwieldy and took an exorbanant amount of time for me to complete. This is because our data base doesn't split up demographics by household, but rather reports as a whole. We can run reports on the individual level or the macro level but not easily on this level. I can tell you how many women, men, and children we served and their ages, but not by household. I can't tell you that household A had 3 children and lived in Auburn unless I look up every client served as an individual. However, because of the small size of the program, I was able to go to each individual's file to complete the report. We did reach out to our data base designer, and was told that they can create a report that we could pull that would meet the needs of this report. Next year, the reporting should be much easier. The other issue with the data was that you list "latino/latinx" as an ethnicity and we do not. So, a person can be LatinX AND Caucasian, or LatinX AND Black. This is why the numbers on the Race tab will not add up. I have no way of pulling the data in any other way. For the "Disabilities" column, our advocates would only mark "yes" if it was self-disclosed by the client. Some advocates, would mark "unknown" and some would mark "no disabilities" so I am not confident about the data in those two particular columns. We have addressed this and that question will be reported accurately moving forward.

Des Moines Area Food Bank 3rd & 4th Qtr 2019 Narrative Report

The second half of 2019 has been a busy time, as our summer meals program got underway with a new program director. Because of the challenges we have had with summer AmeriCorps staffing provided through United Way in the past, we opted this year to hire all our own staff for the summer. This entailed a large increase in program staffing costs but made for a much smoother, less drama-filled season. We served 36,543 total meals at 23 different sites with an average daily attendance of 1,073 children and youth.

At the end of the summer, we rearranged the food bank to allow for a more open service space where clients can see their choices better and move in a freer fashion instead of the previous single line. In particular, we increased space in a separate room for bread, produce, and other items that we have in abundance. Clients can now make unlimited visits to this room and it is open each weekday morning. In addition to produce and bread, clients can also find salads, sandwiches, wraps, other prepared foods and pastry. In the fourth quarter, one of the biggest changes we have seen is an increase in visits to the produce room as our clients gotten accustomed to the system and have started to come multiple times per month.

Management of the produce room is not as easy as the former food bank line was because it requires much more restocking. Our volunteers are really to be congratulated for their hard work making this happen.





The difference for our clients has shown quickly. One client told our director, "Kris, I just want to thank you for this arrangement. My blood sugar was really high but because I've been eating fruits and vegetables it went down almost double. I really enjoy the cooking class. We were learning about squash and I live with my son because I am retired on a fixed income and he loves the squash. We both do so thank you. My doctor is really happy about my blood sugar!"

Many thanks to the cities of Des Moines and SeaTac for their on-going support. As you can see, you are making a difference in peoples' lives!

HealthPoint continued to serve a very diverse patient population in 2019. HealthPoint is the largest provider of primary care to newly arrived refugee families and immigrant families in King County, and a safety net provider for low-income, uninsured and underinsured populations. We are thinking creatively about how we can best serve such a diverse patient population and have spent the past year adapting some evidence-based practices in prenatal care and diabetes care so that our refugee and immigrant patients can be better served. We are beginning to offer group care, where health care providers partner with interpreters to facilitate groups on health topics like diabetes or prenatal care. Group members are able to relate with their physician and each other on a deeper and more meaningful level. The numbers were what we were expecting for 2019. We served 1233 HH with 3815 individuals multiple times thru out the year giving us 24,813 total visits for the year. When I look back on are numbers in years past I had to go back to 2007 before I found similar numbers - 1249 HH with 3773 individuals for a total visit count of 23,453. When the economy tanked in 2008 we continued to climb to a high point of 1929 HH with 6061 individuals visiting 33,833 times in 2010. We bounced around between 1700 and 1800 HH for 4 years. But since 2015 we have been in a decline right thru this year. Funny though how it has been as we have seen are food donations increasing a great number over the last four years to the point of averaging over 39 pounds per person per visit while we had been averaging between 24 - 28 Lbs per person for a long time. The government commodities and Trade Mitigation products have been a big reason for this the last two years. I haven't bought any milk or eggs for almost 18 months as they have been coming from the Government in abundance during this period. We still hear a number of clients having to move out of our area as they can't afford rents in Burien and SeaTac. We still continue to see a lot of new faces as folks seem to be a lot more transient than they use to be. We tend to have between 30 and 60 new clients each month thru out the year. Even our weekend Back Pack program has declined as we used to do about 130 PBK's a week and this year counselors from the schools have only been asking for between 75 and 95 each week. One school doesn't even ask for any anymore. We want to thank both Burien and SeaTac for continuing to support our efforts to keep folks in the Highline area well fed with great nutritional food thru out the year. Were all hoping for a great 2020!

We make every attempt to support our clients in working towards stability. When clients self-exit, it generally indicates they are not ready to take steps forward. This often correlates to a mental health issue or active substance abuse.

Our class has historically been, and continues to be, mostly females between the ages of 25-54. It seems that the majority of the students we get are moms with school-aged children and a bit younger, as our childcare always has a handful of kids each day. It has always been difficult to collect household income data from our students since they fill out our registration form on their first day of class. We think that it's a combination of students being uncomfortable sharing that information with strangers right after they meet, some students genuinely not knowing the answer, and the language barrier. But we'd like to note that, of our students who did provide household income, the majority of them are in the very low income bracket. All of our students are immigrants with low English proficiency.

All of our students are marked as military and disability unknown. We did add a question about disability to our registration form this year, but no one answered it. We think it may be an unknown word for most of our students or something that they are uncomfortable or unsure how to answer. We did not add a question about military service since this particular report asks about US military service and since none of our students are originally from the US it would be a confusing question and difficult for us to parse out the data for reporting.

We'd like to note that while we did not reach the number of SeaTac residents we originally set out to serve, many of the Seattle residents in this report live in the same neighborhoods as our SeaTac residents and their children attend the same schools. We also had about 25 children in the childcare throughout the year that are not captured in our report. At least 12 of those children are SeaTac residents. We're always grateful to be able to serve everyone regardless of their city of residence and hope to continue our partnership with the city of SeaTac and Lutheran Community Services. In our Outcomes spreadsheet, one can see that a fairly small percentage of the students we served participated in our metrics for outcomes. The reason for this is that we do the course evaluations on a single day toward the end of our spring and fall terms. If possible, we do it about a week before the end of the term so that we can follow up with students who weren't in class the day of the

Refugees NW Community Programs led 2 large events in 2019, the Back to School Fair and Holiday of Hope. The funders for these two events are primarily concerned that the participants are SeaTac residents and/or have children that attend SeaTac Schools. This is the main source of information that is collected. Furthermore, this year the Back to School Fair partnered with the Des Moines, Burien, and White Center Back to School Fairs to try to serve all kids across the Highline District. The agreed upon method of tracking the attendants across fairs did not go as planned. At the last minute, registration at the SeaTac Back to School Fair had to take place using paper lists that did not allow us to capture any detailed demographics other than the city that the youth lived in. The coalitions hope to remedy this situation for 2020.

Programming is, in large part, targeted to low-income residents, many of whom are refugees and immigrants. While we have begun to collect more demographic information on participants, we do not require that participants complete demographic information to receive services. It is assumed that the majority of participants coming into our services are at or below the poverty level. For some categories, including Household Income, information was collected, but was not collected in a manner that coincides with the choices for that category. For instance, almost all participants served in across our programs qualify as low income by state guidelines, but we are unable to parse out "Very Low Income" and "Low Income" with the data that was collected.

A large portion of the programming of workshops and educational groups as well as Tax Prep is led by outside agencies who have not been able to provide us with demographic information other than the city of residence for their participants. We continue to seek a solution to this issue. Information on these participants is reported in the "Unknown" category of the demographic measures.

We continue to try to fine tune the database system that we put into place in 2018 to serve our

MSC staff collected the names of households representing south King County individuals receiving rent assistance during the 12 month period June 1, 2018 through May 31, 2019. This lag is necessary to have a full six month period following assistance for the evaluation. Of the 173 households served, MSC identified 107 households with a working phone number and/or e-mail address to contact the household. Of those, staff were able to get responses from 18 households with 17 remaining housed (94% of respondents). Only one household was reported as no longer housed.

We recognize that the response rate for this outcome is lower than we would like and reviewing evaluation processes to increase this rate for the 2020 report.

Major Activities and Accomplishments: The New Roots Fund (NRF) offered training, business plan development and loans to our program participants. To recruit clients, we sent 79 letters to business owners, individuals living in Sea Tac who were refugees resettled by the Diocese of Olympia, former business owners at Bakarro Mall, or members of the general population that had contacted us about business loans. Contacts by letter were followed up with phone calls. Four business development classes where held at the Burien Community Center during the project year. Seventeen persons attended and graduated from the classes.

All 17 received additional follow up activities in the form of individual one-on-one meetings or workshops on special topics such as business insurance. Three of the 17 started a business during the period. Others have a continued interest in business development to supplement or replace their current source of income.

There are multiple barriers when working with students at Chinook Middle School and Tyee High School. Marc Bautista, SFYC Case Manager, has been receiving many referrals from counselors with behavioral and academic problems. With limited capacity, it's difficult not being able to serve all the youth knowing the need. Marc's priority is to work with youth who seriously needs the program to graduate. Marc tries to connect all referred youth to other programs at SFYC or to other partner organizations. With many students at Tyee HS with very low credits, those are the students he takes on. Majority of the referrals involves low grades, attendance, etc. He also works with students who drop out, are gang involved, and or have court involvement. Marc meets with his Tyee caseload every Wednesday after school to go over goals and support in homework.

Another barrier Marc has faced this year is regarding student attendance. In the beginning of the school year, more than 80% of students skipped class. Marc is seeing that more and more youth are losing motivation to attend school. Often it is due to a lack of cultural connection at their schools which leads them to feel like they don't belong or don't matter. There's a lack of cultural representation among school teachers and adults whom they can bond with. Marc has taken advantage of weekends to meet with students who don't come to school. He connects with them and attends hip hop events, workshops, or just hanging out. Once he connects with the youth, he tries to reengage them into school.

Another barrier is culture and connection, at Chinook Middle School, 38% are Latinx students, and at Tyee, 40% are Latinx students. Marc has been working with SafeFutures' Latinx Staff to gain cultural input and support connecting with their families. There is a clear gap of service for the Latinx youth and families in SeaTac due to cultural and language barriers.

In 2019 the New Futures Programs in Seatac, Windsor Heights, served over 500 residents, connecting youth and families with valuable resources and helping youth (K-12) find success both in and out of school (100% of our participants in out-of-school time continue to graduate on time from high school). We continue to meet and exceed all of our City of SeaTac outcomes and this year saw programs expand due to funding through the 21st Century Learning Learning Grant. Our partnership programs, ArtsCorps and GoKic, worked to increase access to STEAM activities and careers for our students. Our services continue to be culturally centered and focused on those most marginalized members of our community. We offered classes and workshops for parents including: ELL classes, Guiding Good Choices (drug/alcohol navigation for parents), cooking classes, parenting workshops, healing circles, and computer classes.

The trends we continue to see within our communities are: the effects of gentrification and inability of families to pay rent and keep up with the cost of living, immigration barriers, systems navigation issues, and underemployment. Our aim is to always center our services on the experiences of the most marginalized.
