In 2020 we were able to 386 undiplicated households, any many of these were helped in the last half of the year. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, we saw a steep increase in the amount of individuals who needed financial assistance and with increased funding from many cities, it made our work load very high but also allowed us to help many more families. Of the individuals that we served this year, 46% of them were children under the age of 18 which shows us that larger families were getting help more often than not. We also saw an increase in immigrant/refugee families which totaled 101 families and made up 10% of the households that we served. We have continued to see an increase in females who we serve as well, which totaled to 56% of the people that we served this year.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our staff has been working at home for the majority of the year and becuase of this, most of our client appointments were done over the phone. I will note that helping clients was a bit more difficult this year because of this and becuase of the volume of calls we were receiving.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, following guidelines set by King County Public Health, Volunteer Services limited services to program participants to minimize the risk of exposure to COVID-19. Since most Volunteer Services clients are in the high-risk category, it has been crucial that the program act with an abundance of caution. Despite the limit on types of service provided, client contact and support was strong. 471 clients were served in 2020. This is similar in the numbers of clients served in previous (470 served in 2019 and 474 served in 2018).

On "Race" tab, the count is higher than other tabs, as two residents, one from Burien and the other from Renton, self-identified with more than one race.

According to National Academics of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine (2020), living alone puts older adults at an "increased risk for social isolation and loneliness because they are more likely to face predisposing factors such as living alone, the loss of family or friends, chronic illness, and sensory impairments". Isolation has tremendous impacts on VS program participant's health. Access to healthcare is a significant challenge for many VS participants. Transportation participants often report that without the assistance of their volunteer, they would be forced to cancel medical appointments.

While VS halted all in-home chore assistance due to rising COVID-19 numbers, it was essential to continue services that could be provided in a safe manner, following King County Public Health guidelines. Basic client needs such as having someone to talk to virtually, grocery/meal/medication deliveries, medical transportation, limited minor home repairs, and limited yard work were met, while taking necessary precautions

Many program participants rely on the in-home chore assistance and did not get the help that they need due to the safety measures taken to avoid the spread of COVID-19. As a result, the program outcome results for self-sufficiency and health improvement were lower than anticipated. Program participants reported not having a volunteer meant they had to pay for services or not being able to keep up with the housework which affects their health such as asthma and allergies. VS will resume providing in-home assistance as soon as it is safe to do so. It is anticipated that outcome numbers will

The past year has been extremely challenging in terms of data collection for everyone served, with multiple new programs launched on short notice in response to COVID (e.g. outreach to homeless, online ordering, Door Dash delivery). In addition, a lot of connectivity to clients is taking place through partner programs unaccustomed to collecting data, and the food bank immediately ended requirements for any identification in order to reduce barriers to food access and increase safety during COVID. It is likely that our unduplicated numbers are underreported, but we have done our best and were able to gather data because we did stay open for regular service rather than move to a drive-thru model.

The most significant statistical change is the 39% increase in unduplicated clients over the past year. Service numbers spiked in the early days of COVID, then decreased significantly, then returned to slightly higher than previous year norms. The vast majority of new clients early in the year came from people who were furloughed from their jobs. In the last month, we had a large number due to the new Door Dash delivery program, including many seniors. Also significant is the increase in the number of immigrants and Limited English Speaking. Many of these families were former clients whom we have not seen since 2011-2013 during the Great Recession. They have been working in businesses such as hotels and restaurants surrounding the airport, as well as yard work and construction; they were quickly furloughed and later laid off altogether as these jobs were impacted by the closure of the economy due to COVID.

HealthPoint's dental patient population for the share1app cities in 2020 was 41% of its levels in 2019. This is, of course, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In March 2020, as the pandemic increased, the CDC and the American Dental Association recommended that all dental services cease except for emergency procedures. Our dental staff were assigned to other duties across the organization as a result. In so doing, we were largely able to avoid layoffs. We also implemented teledentistry via phone and electronic visits that were HIPAA-compliant. However, for the most part, in-person visits did not markedly increase until June, when the CDC lifted its earlier recommendations. While we were able to start seeing patients, we focused on those who had procedures scheduled before the pandemic emerged but for whom those procedures were delayed with the CDC's recommendations. Further, even though we did start seeing patients in person in June, the PPE requirements and safety considerations meant that we scheduled fewer patients (to minimize the amount of time several patients would be present inside the clinic), and to ensure that we did not "burn through" PPE too quickly. By summer 2020, we installed new HVAC systems in our clinics which circulate the air from outside the structure on a continuous basis. By Fall 2020, we were back up to 75% of our usual capacity. With HealthPoint on the frontlines of vaccination efforts, and with continued safe practices, PPE, and proper HVAC systems, we look forward to 2021 and the opportunities for recovery that this coming year presents.

Hospitality House Serves single, adult women-identifying clients experiencing homelessness in South King County. Most of our clients are considered very low income. In 2020 two clients were above the very low income bracket upon entry into the Hospitality House shelter program; one client was low-income and one client had moderate income.

A majority of our clients are above the age of 35, although we open our services to all women 18 and older.

The annual Point in Time Count conducted to represent homeless populations breaks down homeless individuals into sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons. This demographic report does not represent such populations or consider previous living situations. For example, last year 37% of Hospitality House clients were residing in a place not meant for habitation before entering Hospitality House; for a majority of these clients, this place was a vehicle. For others, they were staying outside. 23% of our residents entered Hospitality House after living with family or friends for a short time. Although this constitutes shelter, these living situations are unstable or temporary.

The race demographics section lacks a way to distinguish ethnicity. Therefore, clients who reported Hispanic ethnicity were categorized as their race without consideration for ethnic distinction. Without a way to distinguish ethnicity, there is no way to represent the Hispanic homeless population accurately. In 2020 Hospitality House hosted a total of 5 Hispanic residents. One Hispanic White/Caucasian was from Burien, one Hispanic Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander was from Federal Way, one Hispanic White/Caucasian was from Kent, one Hispanic Black/African American was from Tukwila, and one Hispanic Black/African American was from Seattle.

In response to the COVID-19 and Shelter In Place Mandates, Hospitality House extended grace to clients beyond the typical 90-day stay in our program. Consequently, we served fewer clients than average in 2020. Beyond the health and safety of our residents, we also needed to acknowledge the increase to housing waitlist times and the decrease in housing options such as transitional housing programs.

It was a difficult year for us (as well as for all other service providers, we know). In March, we cut our winter quarter short and transitioned into brainstorm/planning mode. We came up with a model that would work for continuing our class with the students we already had and hoped to add a few more students to our group along the way. We shifted to having class via WhatsApp and mailing out packets of worksheets that we could work from to students each week. We set up a class blog where students could access videos and additional resources and had students take pictures of all their class work and text them to the instructor for feedback.

As in other years, the majority of our students were women (mostly stay-at-home moms). The question of household income is always a difficult one for us to collect complete data for because our students are asked to answer this question on their registration form on the first day of class. The majority of our students do not answer this question because they either don't understand what it's asking, don't know the answer, or are uncomfortable sharing this information with people they don't know well. We were able to get our registration form translated into some of the languages that the majority of our students speak, but some of our students didn't learn to read/write in their first language and then our shift to remote learning moved our registration form to a Google Form and would only be translated if students had to tech know-how to translate a web page. We also don't ask about disability or military service on our registration form, so that information is all unknown.

In our annual outcomes report, there is a fairly large gap between the number of participants enrolled in the program and the number of participants measured for the outcomes. In outcome #1, we moved our course evaluations to Google Forms and asked students to respond, but since they are anonymous, we had no way of knowing who had responded and who hadn't, so we couldn't follow-up with those who had yet to complete the survey. Outcome #2 relies on comparing a pre- and post-test and we, unfortunately, were unable to get both for a number of students due to an absence on the day it was administered in class (while we were in-person) or an inability to find a good time to All of the students who actively participated in class showed improvement in one or more areas, we were just unable to capture that improvement using this data collection method.

Despite the harsh challenges that accompanied the pandemic, our Housing Advocate was able to work with multiple partners including Summer Meals AmeriCorps members, Public Health for free COVID19 testing, and Project Cool for backpack and school supply delivery. MSC staff are thankful of the school districts' quick response to providing McKinney Vento scholars with access to laptops and hotspots for access to school. During the pandemic, MSC staff have been providing limited in-person services, and primarily conducting meetings with customers over the phone and via email. Although we did not met our goals for serving a SeaTac family at the shelter, we conducted extensive outreach, including a direct partnership with Neighborhood House to receive a referral for a SeaTac household. We are grateful that we have been able to provide existing program participants from several South King County cities with safe shelter.

This has resulted in a lower actual success rate. MSC staff turnover has affected outcomes but we are confident in increasing our outcomes more positively in the new year.

Major Activities and Accomplishments: The New Roots Fund (NRF) offered training, business plan development and loans to our program participants. To recruit clients, we sent letters to business owners, individuals living in Sea Tac who were refugees resettled by the Diocese of Olympia, former business owners at Bakarro Mall, or members of the general population that had contacted us about business loans. Contacts by letter were followed up with phone calls. Four business development classes where held at the Burien Community Center or by Zoom during the contract year. Seventeen persons attended and graduated from the classes.

All 17 received additional follow up activities in the form of individual one-on-one meetings or workshops on special topics such as business insurance. Two of the 17 started a business during the period. Others have a continued interest in business development to supplement or replace their current source of income.

Due to COVID, PIE residents were experiencing massive lay-offs and housing instability. Covid-19 has been difficult for everyone and especially devastating for the immigrant and refugee community. Many of our South King County residents work in service jobs, the airport, hospitality and retail, industries that have been hit hardest by this crisis. PIE has scaled up our work to provide relief through rental, employment, unemployment assistance, food/baby supply distribution and other social services. We have seen heavily increase needs around unemployment and rental assistance, as more families were facing homelessness and job insecurity. This year, PIE was proud to be able to expand our work and work efficiently remotely to address the community's needs. Other key work we have done this year was provide 14 know your rights/labor standards trainings to the community empowering them to advocate for their rights and the rights of their family and friends. We have also launched an environmental youth internship program, providing paid work to 33 immigrant and refugee youth to clean city parks and learn about careers in the environmental sector.

Case manager, Tevin Gladney, notices difficulty in collecting demographic information from new clients about immigration status. This is a very sensitive subject among families we work with because of the current climate and distrust in systems. Some trends that occur lately is that many immigrant families are losing their jobs due to COVID, specifically Hispanic mothers who have had history in the service industry and have lost employment, seeking unemployment benefits and financial help. This causes stress for the youth to seek employment to help their families survive and get through the pandemic. One youth on his caseload that is homeless are finding it more difficult to obtain affordable housing in the nearby Burien area. Lately, Tevin also finds that his low and very low income youth have more difficulty with motivation to attend college because they are 1st generation, older siblings did not finish college after taking out loans, expenses during the pandemic are tough, families are out of work, and online school does not appeal much to them. They are put in a survival mode position to help take care of their families. It is also noticed that there is a box for "Multi Racial" which left out the data for one of his youth who is Black / Alaskan Native.

There are multiple barriers when working with students this year. One of the biggest barriers Marc, Case Manager in SeaTac has faced this year is Virtual Learning. Students who are currently enrolled in school are struggling with learning online. Because of this new obstacle everyone is facing, our youth is struggling to pay attention and engage through each class. Marc's youth has

Trends appear to be pretty similar to previous years. The majority of those outreached were white and middle aged. We continue to see an increase in homeless individuals who identify as female and have seen this over the last couple of years (75 females this year, up from 45 last year). During this current political climate, many will not disclose their immigrant or refugee status and our outreach workers have found the with the added stress of COVID, many are less trustful of the social service system then before which may lead to skewed data. We also acknowledge that our primary outreach worker this year was a young white male, which could have also impacted the ability to connect with a more diverse population. We remain committed to employing outreach workers with various ethnic backgrounds to attempt to reduce this potential barrier to engagement.

Over the year, we made several changes in order to better meet the overwhelming needs of our community, due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Our organization continued to deploy our community response team to deliver necessary food and basic supplies items to our community. Forming this web of support was critical in engaging in meaningful support to the community. Our development team initiated a community response fund and we were able to disburse over \$150,000 in rental and utility assistance. We know that family stability is critical to the well-being of our young people.

Additionally, we leveraged the strength of our partnerships by investing in a new collaborative, 'Feeding El Pueblo' with Para los Ninos, Lake Burien Presbyterian, Colectiva Legal, and LaRoxay Productions to bring cultural appropriate food to our community. Families living in S. King County (attending Highline School District) had the opportunity to access culturally appropriate food boxes each Monday. This 3 month project turned into a 6 month program, with the hopes of securing funding for future efforts.

Our out-of-school-time Coordinators have become incredibly tech savvy over the past year-designing websites, implementing project-based learning, and finding ways to connect in our community gardens in distanced ways. Overall, I believe our programs have mounted a nimble and compassionate response under extremely difficult circumstances. Our young people continue to find safe space in our virtual spaces and continue to engage, learn, and grow.
