1. Call to Order	Meeting was called to order at 4:00 PM by Councilmember Iris Guzmán.
Approval of Minutes	Minutes from the October 6, 2022, meeting were approved as written.
3. Public Comment	None
4. Human Services Funding Recommendations 2023-2024	The Community Services Advisory Committee (CSAC) reviewed the applications for human services funding for 2023-2024 and their recommendations are being presented. Sixty-four applications were received and CSAC is recommending to fund 39 of them.  Lawrence Ellis explained the four funding categories and the percentages that were targeted for each category.  Judith Williams, Chair, Community Services Advisory Committee was available for questions.

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	The Committee questioned the targeted percentages for the categories and want to discuss possible new percentages for future allocation. CM Egal recommended increasing the 1.5% of the general fund dedicated to the human service contract funding. They requested to review each of the applications for funding requests prior to taking any action. Staff will provide the applications and return to the Committee for recommendation.  No action was taken.
5. Defending SeaTac's trees & community health & equity	Michael Fitzpatrick reviewed the action items listed on the Council Request Form that was submitted in by Mayor Simpson and presented how those actions are currently being implemented. He shared the current strategies and practices that the City uses to maintain urban forest acreage by caring for the trees throughout the City.  Deputy Mayor Negusse requested tracking trees planted by agencies/developers to ensure accountability for the Port of Seattle flight safety corridor program requirement of 4:1 replanting. Michael informed the Committee that the Port has requested no tree planting take place south of S. 136th Street as it impacts the flight safety corridor. Data for trees planted in North SeaTac Park north of S. 136th Street is maintained by SeaTac staff.  No Committee action is being requested as this presentation is for informational purposes only.
6. African Community Housing & Development request to utilize human services off-cycle funding.	The purpose of this presentation is to request a recommendation from the Parks and Recreation Committee authorizing the City Manager to enter into a contract with African Community Housing and Development (ACHD) to utilize the Human Services Off-Cycle Funding in the amount of \$150,000. The additional funds being requested will allow ACHD to serve 41 households with rental assistance that are currently on a waiting list.  Representatives from African Community Housing and Development including Bree Nicolello, Kevin Vargas, and Bilan Aden were available for questions.  The Committee unanimously supports moving this item forward to the Regular Council Meeting Consent Agenda.

#### PRESENTATION OVERVIEW

#### PURPOSE OF PRESENTATION

Present the funding recommendations for Human Service agencies by the Community Services Advisory Committee.

#### WHY IS THIS ISSUE IMPORTANT?

- 1. Utilizing 1.5% of the General Fund allows funds for many human services agencies that provide services for the SeaTac residents.
- 2. Funding is a 2-year cycle that many human services agencies depend on in order to continue to provide services to SeaTac residents.
- 3. These funds provide rental assistance, supports food banks, medical care, supports shelters for the homeless and other important services.



#### **APPLICATION TIMELINE**

February/March – Applicants must submit in application to Share1App.

April – City received 64 applications.

May – Applications are uploaded, printed and ready for pickup by Community Services Advisory Committee (CSAC) members.

June/October – Applications are reviewed by CSAC members.

October – Recommended funding 39 out of 64 applications.

November – Presenting recommendations to Parks and Recreation Committee

December – Presenting funding recommendations to the City Council for approval.



#### **ADOPTED FUNDING CATEGORIES**

- 1. Basic Needs (Urgent) Ex: Food; Medical Care; Shelter; Help Line; Domestic Violence Support
- 2. Basic Needs (Long Term) Ex: Case Management; Social Work/Support; Therapy/Counseling/Legal Services; Mental Health
- 3. Education, Training Workshops. Ex: Pre-apprentice Training; Employment Placement; Educational Support; English Language Support
- 4. Supporting Businesses. Ex: Entrepreneur; Apprenticeships
