Subject: City Center/Airport District Subarea Plan Project Briefing

Summary

City staff has been working with a consultant team since the summer of 2022 on the City Center/Airport District Subarea Plan and Code Project, the second phase of a two phase project to update the existing <u>City Center Plan</u> (adopted 1999). The main goals of the subarea plan and code project are to:

- 1) Add detail to the community vision and development concept adopted in the <u>City Center Plan</u>
 <u>Update Phase 1 Vision Report</u> in 2020 through technical analysis and community input, and
- 2) Identify programs and projects SeaTac can undertake to implement the vision over a twenty-year time frame through the City budget, development incentives, regulatory changes, and other departmental activities. (The identification of zoning code updates is funded in this project.)

This memo provides a status update of the project and highlights issues that will be further discussed at the March 7th project briefing.

Project Status Update

Below is an overview of anticipated project milestones, including those completed or underway (tasks identified with check mark).

• Step 1: Launch & Envision

- ✓ Reviewed and compiled background information on pertinent plans, studies and City Center Plan Update Phase 1 Vision Report.
- ✓ Ongoing work to build demographic profile of district.
- ✓ Ongoing coordination underway with related City projects including Public Works Department's <u>Airport Pedestrian Improvement Project</u> (sidewalk improvements to be made within district's center adjacent to SeaTac/Airport light rail station) and Economic Development Division's Tourism Destination Development Plan (which will focus on how the City can better leverage on the local visitor and traveler economy).
- ✓ Completed Community Engagement Plan, which will be regularly updated and refined to ensure robust and inclusive engagement with residents, workers, visitors, community organizations, businesses, and property owners.
- Step 2: Analyze & Coordinate (tasks underway)
 - ✓ Developing market analysis to assess economic opportunities that support district vision.
 - ✓ Analyzing existing transportation network for all modes (pedestrians, bicycles, vehicles, transit)
- Step 3: Complete Plan & Implementation Strategies (tasks not yet started)
 - Anticipated project completion: Fall 2023.
- On-Going: Community Engagement Activities (On-going through end of project)
 - ✓ January: Rollout of project website & "Big Ideas Poll" in City's official languages including English, Spanish, Vietnamese, Amharic, and Somali.










COMMUNITY DEMOGRAPHICS/TYPE OF HOUSING

WHO LIVES IN & NEAR CITY CENTER/ AIRPORT DISTRICT?

Mostly multi-family residents (~76%), mobile home park residents (18%), and single-family residents (~6%)

- Multi-family units: ~ 1,698 units
 - Apartments: ~1,488 units
 - Condo: ~210 units
- Bow Lake Mobile Home Park: 400+ pads
- Single-family units: ~148 parcels
 - Note: All single-family properties within City Center could be upzoned to townhouse or 4-story mixed use buildings.



WHO LIVES IN & NEAR CITY CENTER/AIRPORT DISTRICT?

- A lot of renters with more renters in City Center/Airport District than in extended neighborhood.
- Households with lower incomes and higher housing cost burden live in District than extended community (City Center + Central SeaTac)

Preliminary Demographic Data	City Center + Central SeaTac	City Center/Airport District Only
Renters	54%	64%
Median household income	\$77,000	\$47,944
Housing Cost Burden (pay more than 30% of income on housing)	42%	*Likely higher % of renters in City Center cost burdened (Housing Action Plan found that SeaTac renters are more cost burdened than homeowners with 54% of renters cost burdened citywide.)




Figure 2: Race and Ethnicity of the Subarea population compared to Citywide population




COMMUNITY DEMOGRAPHICS

WHO LIVES IN & NEAR CITY CENTER/AIRPORT DISTRICT?

Likely large populations from immigrant communities, significant number of non-English speakers

- 48% speak only English at home (higher than citywide population)
- 28% say speak English "less than very well" (higher than citywide)
- Most common non-English languages in District likely East African (Somali, Amharic, others)



English proficiency of households who speak a language other than English at home

DEMOGRAPHIC ASSESSMENT INDICATES REPRESENTATIVE & INCLUSIVE ENGAGEMENT WILL REQUIRE OUTREACH TO:

- BIPOC communities
- Immigrant communities and those who speak other than English at home (52% of City Center + Central SeaTac population)
