What was new in 2011?

Two public access heart defibrillators were received through a grant. One will be installed at the SeaTac Police Headquarters and the other in the Tyee High School Education Complex. Staff at both locations will be trained in their use. Public access defibrillators provide early intervention during a cardiac arrest event and increase the chances of a patient's survival.

The CodeRed reverse 911 system was upgraded and updated in 2011 and now allows residents more options when signing up to receive emergency information from the City of SeaTac. To sign up, go to www.ci.seatac.wa.us and click on "CodeRed".

An inter-local agreement was signed and went into effect with the Kent Fire Department in early 2011 to provide the Administrative, Prevention/Code Enforcement, Public Information and Education, Training, Emergency Management, and Fire Investigation services for the SeaTac Fire Department. This agreement will help reduce costs and save taxpayers money.

In September, an Americorp VISTA (Volunteers In Service To America) began working as a full time employee for one year in the city's Emergency Management Division. The VISTA employee, whose position is paid for through a grant, will work to revise the city's Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan (CEMP). The CEMP is the city's plan and procedure guideline for dealing with a natural or manmade disaster.



The SeaTac and Burien Police and Fire Departments successfully graduated another Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) class. CERT is an eight week program that trains civilians in basic skills to better prepare them for a disaster. Contact the SeaTac Police Department at 206.973.4917 for more information.




What to expect in 2012

To better serve the residents of SeaTac, the Fire Department Community Assistance Referral and Education Services (FDCARES) program will begin in 2012. FDCARES connects seniors and medically fragile residents with the resources they require but have not received. In addition to helping those in need, FDCARES also reduces calls to 9-1-1 and increases the availability of emergency responders for other emergencies.

The Automatic First Response Agreement with the Kent and South King Fire and Rescue Fire Departments will be expanded to improve the emergency response services to residents and businesses. All three fire departments are dispatched from the same 9-1-1 center and the agreement will help ensure that residents get the quickest possible response to their emergencies.


The recently updated CodeRed emergency notification system will be tested in 2012 to ensure that it works properly and to notify the public that the system is ready for an emergency.

The SeaTac Fire Department will continue with its study for consolidation of services with the Kent Fire Department. This agreement, if worthwhile, would expand upon the existing inter-local agreement between the two departments.
