

City Manager's Weekly Update

April 10, 2009

Dear Mayor, Councilmembers, Residents, and Employees:

Proposed Community Garden: The Parks and Recreation Department would like to make some park improvements to the former Riverton Heights Elementary School property. City Council members suggested that a community vegetable garden be provided on the Riverton School Site. We propose to send out letters to the community to determine their interest in the proposed community vegetable garden. The proposed area for improvement would consist of a number of plots 100 and 200 square feet in size constructed by the city that would be available on a yearly basis at a nominal fee to cover the expense of providing a water source and administration. The community's involvement would be to assume ownership and maintain the individual plots.

City Seeking Funding for S. 154th Street Project: The City received some good news this week regarding potential federal funding for the S. 154th Street Project. First, Congressman Adam Smith selected the project for his list of 2010 federal appropriations requests. The City successfully demonstrated the valuable benefits the project would bring to the area to justify making Congressman Smith's list. Second, the King County caucus of the Puget Sound Regional Council Transportation Policy Board selected the S. 154th Street Project as one of twelve projects in King County to compete regionally for federal funds. The City previously was awarded a \$2.2 million grant from the Washington State Transportation Improvement Board. Planned improvements include sidewalks, bicycle lanes, turn lanes and utility conversion to underground. This project will provide transportation infrastructure to support redevelopment of the light rail station area, which will provide 290 new jobs and 250 retained jobs.

Des Moines Open House Proposal to Widen 24th Avenue S. and S. 216th Street: The City of Des Moines is proposing to widen 24th Avenue S. and S. 216th Street to five lanes in order to accommodate planned growth. While both streets are under Des Moines' jurisdiction, SeaTac businesses occupy properties along the east edge of 24th Avenue S. and SeaTac residents and businesses are along the north side of S. 216th Street. The City of Des Moines is conducting an Open House to discuss the street widening with affected parties.

City of SeaTac Receives WellCity Award: The City of SeaTac recently received the honor of its fifth consecutive "WellCity" Award from the Association of Washington Cities (AWC) for its worksite wellness program. The City has a very active Wellness program with activities developed by an employee committee which is coordinated through the Human Resources Department. Worksite wellness programs help reduce employee health risks and health care costs. The AWC WellCity Award recognizes cities that achieve a standard of excellence in employee health promotion including the following criteria:

- Demonstrate that the wellness program has the support and involvement of elected officials, management, and employees.
- Develop and follow an operating plan that considers the employees needs and interests.
- Provide a variety of health awareness information, educational opportunities, behavior change programs, and a work environment that promotes healthy lifestyles.
- Show a method for measuring the program's success.

These standards serve as a guidepost for cities to follow in designing quality wellness programs and encourage a continued commitment to healthy employees and a healthy workplace. The AWC WellCity Award will be presented to SeaTac's City Manager at its annual conference in June.

Shooting Incident in SeaTac: Our Police Department received a report at around 4:10 PM on Wednesday afternoon, of a shooting at S. 188th/International Blvd. Officers were on scene within moments, and found two adult male victims in a car at the intersection. A younger female and child had also been in the car but escaped injury. Two other vehicles had been damaged when the victim's vehicle struck theirs. The SeaTac Fire Department also responded along with Medics, and the victims were transported to Harborview Hospital.

It was initially believed the suspects may have still been in the area. The neighborhood to the southeast of the intersection was cordoned off for a period of time so that a search could be conducted. The scene response and investigation included SeaTac detectives, Sheriff's Office Major Crimes detectives, and other King County Sheriff's Office support personnel (a gunsniffing dog, videographer, etc).

While that part of the investigation continued officers received a call from Riverton Hospital that another gunshot victim had arrived there. Our police quickly determined that it was related to the shooting. A short time later our officers located the suspect vehicle near S. 128/24th S. and set up surveillance. Two subjects came out of a residence and entered their car, and then were stopped and detained. The car was impounded for later processing and evidence recovery.

Detectives have arrested and booked one person, and the investigation is ongoing. SeaTac Police were assisted by Burien officers and unincorporated deputies. We also had significant help from the Port of Seattle Police Department. Chief Graddon has expressed thanks to those involved.

Spring Recycling Event: The City had a successful recycling event Saturday, April 4, at the Tyee Educational Complex parking lot. Much of what we throw away still has value. These events reuse or recycle these discarded materials, keeping them out of the trash. Grants from the

King County Waste Reduction and Recycling program, the Local Hazardous Waste Management program, and Department of Ecology's Coordinated Prevention Grant program fund these recycling events.

Brown Bag Event Held at City Hall: On Wednesday, April 8, the City of SeaTac hosted a residential rental property owners and managers network brown bag luncheon in the Council Chambers. The event was co-sponsored by Officer Doug Reynolds and Neighborhood Coordinator Trudy Olson. The guest speaker was Julie Johnson, President of the Rental Housing Association of Puget Sound. Her topic was, "How your rentals can thrive during an economic downturn." Fourteen property owners and managers representing regional management companies and local apartment homes attended. Their critiques indicated a strong desire for quarterly meetings with some managers offering their properties as meeting sites.


