Garbage, Recycling and Yard Debris Holiday Collection Update Thanksgiving Schedule

Allied Waste/Republic Services will NOT be collecting garbage, recycling and yard debris on Thanksgiving Day, Thursday, November 22. Allied Waste hauls to the King County transfer station and the transfer station observes the Thanksgiving holiday. Please note the following schedule:

Looking ahead to the December and January holiday schedule

The other observed holidays are Christmas and New Year's Day. This year, those holidays fall on a TUESDAY, which means that most of Allied Waste/Republic customers will be affected. For two weeks in a row (the weeks of December 24 and 31) Allied Waste/Republic Services will observe a rolling schedule as follows:

Monday (December 24 & 31) – collection as usual Tuesday (December 25 & January 1) – no collection

Rolling schedule begins

Wednesday (December 26 & January 2) – Tuesday customers collected Thursday (December 27 & January 3) – Wednesday customers collected Friday (December 28 & January 4) – Thursday customers collected Saturday (December 29 & January 5) – Friday customers collected

Holiday and Winter Safety Tips

As we continue through fall and into winter, the SeaTac Fire Department asks all residents to please consider the following fire and life safety tips to help ensure they have a safe and enjoyable holiday season.

Carbon Monoxide: (CO) is a colorless, almost odorless, and tasteless gas which is present during any type of burning. This includes wood stoves, gas furnaces, wood burning fireplaces, generators, and vehicle emissions. When inhaled, it depletes the oxygen supply in the blood stream. Symptoms of CO poisoning include lightheadedness, dizziness, headaches, nausea, vomiting, seizures, decreased levels of consciousness, and in extreme cases, death.

Residents can be proactive and protect themselves by following these simple steps:

- Have all CO producing devices in the home inspected by a professional.
- Never bring barbeques or running generators into a home.
- Purchase and install a carbon monoxide alarm in your home.
- If you or someone in your home begins complaining of the symptoms listed above or your CO alarm activates, leave your residence immediately and call 9-1-1.

Smoke Alarms: Have working smoke alarms and know how to escape if they activate. Change the batteries annually and replace your smoke alarms every ten years.

Electric heaters: Ensure that all portable space heaters and baseboard heaters have at least three feet of clearance around them to prevent fires. Keep all combustibles such as curtains, bedding, and clothing away. Purchase heaters that have an auto-shutoff feature when tipped over and that have an Underwriters Laboratory (UL) rating.

Cooking: Whenever you are cooking, "keep an eye on what you fry". Never leave the kitchen when cooking and always keep pan lids handy. If a pan catches on fire, simply place the matching lid on the pan while wearing an oven mitt. Once the lid is on, turn off the burner and call 9-1-1. To reduce injuries, create a "kid free" zone in front of your stove and oven.

Candles: During the holidays and power outages candles are commonly used for decoration and light. Use them wisely. Place candles in a non-tipping base and set them where they cannot be easily knocked over by children, pets, or breezes. Always keep candles away from combustibles such as drapes, bedding, clothing, holiday decorations, and Christmas trees. Lastly, "when you go out – blow it out". Never leave candles burning when you leave the room.

Decoration: Keep paper or other flammable decorations away from heat sources. Ensure breakable decorations such as tree ornaments are kept out of the reach of children and pets. Make sure all holiday lights, extension cords, and other electrical devices have the UL seal of approval. Never overload extension cords or create an extension cord "octopus".

Indoor trees: Keep cut trees well watered and away from heat sources, including candles. Use only indoor rated light strings. Dispose of the tree if needles begin falling off in large numbers.

SeaTac Fire Personnel Busy at Summer Brush Fires

While it's raining now, it was a very dry summer and SeaTac Fire personnel were busy assisting other agencies at wildland fires. It was an interesting and taxing year on all the regions resources, with four local or regional mutual aid requests; a brush fire in Key Peninsula, assisting Valley Regional Fire Authority at a stubborn ground fire near the Green River community college, the Power Line-2 fire in Shelton and assisting Enumclaw fire & Department of Natural Resources to end the season.

Battalion Chief John Madson is a "red carded" Strike Team Leader and responded, along with our red carded Explorers, on State Mobilizations to the Barker Canyon and Table Mountain Fires in eastern Washington, as well as the Power Line Fire near Shelton. Barker Canyon involved protecting the Grand Coulee dam area. Table Mountain was the protection of the town of Liberty.

The Explorers and the Puget Sound Skills Center have jointly owned and operated a brush truck with King County Fire District (KCFD) 20 for three years and provide service to the State, Region and Zone. Five red carded wildland explorers participated this year utilizing training they received from the Skill Center and KCFD 44. Explorers responded to the Antoine 2, Taylor Bridge, and Wenatchee Complex fires in eastern Washington, as well as the Key Peninsula, Green River Community College, and Enumclaw brush fires in western Washington. The Taylor Bridge was an "immediate need" response where over 60 homes where lost.

The City and the Explorers are reimbursed for costs on State Mobilizations. Responses to major incidents also provides valuable experience in managing large events, that could by very valuable in the event of a major emergency or disaster in SeaTac. For the Explorers, with the funds received this year, they are hoping to upgrade the unit and equipment. In addition, it is a great apprenticeship opportunity and they plan on continuing to use these personnel and others as they graduate to help staff brush engines in Zone-3 and provide support to the wildland hand crew.





The City of SeaTac Fire Department is offering a combined Adult CPR, AED, & First Aid Class.

Class Description: Adult CPR/AED or Adult CPR/AED & First Aid Class

- American Heart Association Heartsaver Adult CPR.
- Will teach you how to recognize and treat life-threatening emergencies, including cardiac arrest and choking.
- You will receive a certification card.
- This class is for the lay person and not intended for health care providers.
