


SeaTac Municipal Court State of the Court 2012-2013

# Case filing Reductions

- In 2012, reduction in case filings:
  - Traffic Infractions ↓ 15.8%
  - Parking Infractions 47.5%

  - Requests for Domestic Violence Protection Orders down 1 5%
  - Requests for Anti-Harassment Orders 4 62.5%
  - Overall reduction in case filing: 4.3%

# Case filing Increases

In 2012, increases in case filings:

Non-traffic Criminal cases 18.2%

#### Warrant Walk-ins

- ▶ 150 defendants in 2012 avoided arrest through Warrant Walk-in Program
- Savings of at least 300 jail days (day of booking, ordered for video next day)
- January 2013 number of warrant walk-ins almost double January 2012

- Payments by telephone after hours and online (N-Court) 24 hours/day
  - On-line Payments began in February, 2012
  - The Court has averaged 60 payments each month through N-Court
  - In 2012, the Court received \$72,020.50 in payments through N-Court

## Improvements 2012

- Increased content on web-page
  - City of SeaTac : Municipal Court
- Increased community outreach
  - Law Week
  - Quarterly Newsletter delivered via e-mail and accessible on-line <u>Court Newsletter Spring</u> <u>2012.docx</u>
  - Judge visits to classroom
  - Food4food
    - For every four cans of food donated, people received a bag of homemade treats
    - Donated 220 pounds to the Highline Food Bank

# Improvements 2012

- Improvement in Interpreter program
  - Reduced clerk time spent on ordering and confirming interpreters to appear
  - Interpreters can check-in and check-out at the clerks counter using their smart phone
  - Interpreter jobs are posted, and interpreters themselves can accept the jobs if available
- State Reimbursement for interpreter costs:
  - \$10,132.37
- ▶ Total Above Projected Revenue: \$5,132.37
  - Total Expenditure for Interpreter services Below Budget: \$11,488.74

# Improvements 2012

- Cross-training Clerks
  - Clerks learning different aspects of court administration and desk duties
  - Able to slip into another clerk's desk if we are short staffed
  - More efficient court operation

#### **Probation Services**

- On average, 110 cases on Active Probation
  - 60% DUI/Physical Control
  - 23% Domestic Violence
  - 5% Theft
  - 12% Other

#### **Probation Services**

- Jail Alternatives (funded by Defendants)
  - 18 defendants served through Day Reporting
    - Served in lieu of 59 days jail
  - 3 defendants served through Community Work
    - Community benefited from 87 work hours (in lieu of 25 days jail)
  - 6 Defendants served through Electronic Home Monitoring
    - Served in lieu of 233 days jail
- Total jail days saved using alternative sentencing: 317

# Probation Revenue vs. Expense

- Defendants paid \$83,807.55 towards probation costs;
- Expenditures totaled \$79,857.03 inclusive of \$71,316.03 paid to Tukwila for monitoring services.

- Increased access to justice
  - Public access terminal in lobby
- One public defense firm to handle both incourt and in-custody hearings
  - Defendants spend fewer days in jail
  - Need to transport defendants significantly decreased
    - Officers not taken off street for transport
    - Reduced security issues

- Lead Clerk
  - Takes on more administrative responsibilities
- Internship Program
  - Partner with Highline Community College
  - Duties
    - Reminder calls to defendants
    - Assistance with customer service surveys
    - Research court programs
    - Public defense application information retrieval

- Facilities improvements
  - Secure Court offices and inmate transport areas
  - Court spaces ADA compliant
- Equipment improvements
  - Acquired through grant
  - All-in-one printer at counsel table and computers for both attorneys saves Court time, clerk time, legal assistant time

- Court Leadership Team
  - Consists of Judge, Administrator, Lead clerk, one Judicial Assistant position that rotates each year
  - Focus on improvement of service and efficient operation
