He was elected to the Seattle City Council in 1978, then re-elected in 1979, 1983, and 1987. After serving as Mayor, he served as CEO and President of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Seattle. In 2009, He was named CEO of the non-profit Seattle Foundation.

As a graduate of both Highline Community College and University of Washington, Former Mayor Rice was first recipient of the Highline Community College Distinguished Alumni Award in 1990.

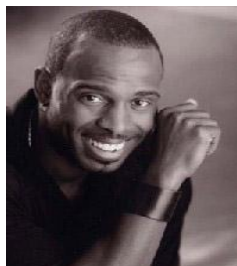
